#### THE LOWER SIUSLAW

Personal and General Notes From Western End of Lane County

The Washalore arrived at Florence Wednesday evening from San Francisco. Next morning the freight was discharged and the vessel went to Acme to load with lumber.

Mrs. George E. Gibbs and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Geo. H. Gibbs, went to Eugene last Tuesday. They took out Mrs. Zoe Alexander's little boy, who has made his home with them for several years past, and will send him to his mother in Portland.

Two automobiles made the trip from Eugene to Mapleton Wednesday. The driver of one of the machines informed us that if some of the rock were removed from the centre of the road in a few places that it would be an easy run for an auto. This would take only three or four days' work and would greatly improve the road.

SELLS 7000 BUSHELS

The Lane County Vetch Growers' Association has sold its pool of vetch for \$2.50 per bushel. The pool amounts to 3500 sacks, or 7000 bushels. This is the best price yet received for vetch, and growers are greatly pleased at their first effort in pooling issues. Vetch is not only a profitable crop, but it restores the soil and a crop is equal to a good treatment or fertilizer. However, like other grains, crops must be rotated to secure a profitable yield. Everything raised by the farmer this year commands a good price.—Junction City Times.

### NEW RAILWAY FROM

EUGENE TO FLORENCE

People at Mouth of the Siuslaw Have Some Genuine Excitement

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 15.—L. A. Liljeqvist, of Coquille, was in the city this morning on his way home from Florence. He reports the people of that section are in throes of a much greater railway excitement than the people of Coos Bay. The road from Eugene to Florence is now under construction as far as making surveys and securing right-of-way is concerned. The people of Florence have been told that if the Eugene road is completed that far that Coos Bay will build to Florence and they are eager for further information and confirmation.

The \$150,000 bond issue which was voted to the port commission there has been sold and only awaits the Supreme Court decision in the Coos Bay case to be delivered. They secured an unusual good deal with their bonds, the parties taking them agreeing to furnish the money only as needed and no interest is charged until the money is thus delivered.

The appointment of these two men on recommendation of their respective Congressmen is a setback for Senator Bourne, who sought to have at least a veto in them, though long-established custom has allowed members of the House to fill such positions.

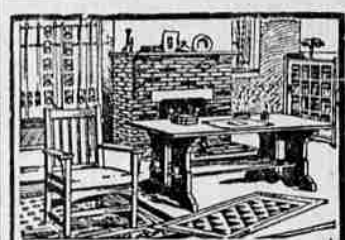

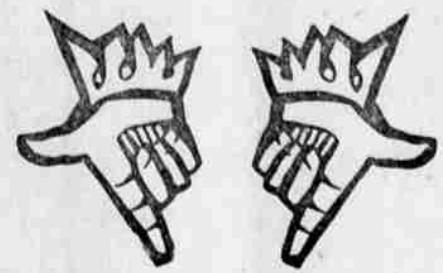
