REGARDING THE DEADLY FLY

Seven different varieties of flies are found in our houses, 98 per cent of which are represented by the common house fly. Flies lay their eggs only in fermenting or decaying substances—by preference in horse manure. Hence every stable is a centre of infection unless periodically disinfected. The fly maggot is also hatched out in latrines and asphalt refuse, such as bedding, straw, rags, paper, scraps of meat, fruit, etc., on which substances the larvae exist after they are hatched, which occurs in about twelve days after the egg has been laid. It is estimated that a single fly, laying 120 eggs at a time, will produce a progeny amounting to sextillions by the end of the season.

The number of bacteria upon a single fly have been proved to range all the way from 550 to 6,000,000. The average for 414 flies which were examined at the agricultural experiment station at Storrs, Conn., last year was 1,230,000 bacteria apiece. This represents about the number of bacteria that enter the human system when one swallows a glass of liquid into which some fly has perhaps fallen, to be removed by the slovenly waiter without the liquid being thrown away.

Now that vacation time is almost over and people are returning to their homes and business, the Siuslaw railroad movement should receive a new impetus and the money necessary to justify the commencement of the work should be raised in a hurry. Eugene and Lane county need this railroad in order to keep up present growth and prosperity. An outlet to navigable water will give us all the benefits that should accrue from the construction of a railroad to cross the mountains into Eastern Oregon. It would make Eugene the distributing point for a vast territory now in the first stages of development. Why can't every property owner and businessman realize the importance of this movement?

There is one thing that the elder Mrs. Shaw can be thankful for, and that is, she will know where her son is at nights during the next few years. LOCALS TRIM ALL-STARS OF PORTLAND

Sid Smith's Bunch Wins Good Game in Afternoon, Loses Morning Contest

The largest crowd of the season turned out Sunday afternoon to see the pick of all-stars of Portland play ball against the locals, and it was surely a battle royal, and the best part of all was that the locals won by a 4-1 score. A great many fans have been thinking that the locals could not beat a real fast bunch—but their opinions are changed now, as they defeated the fastest team in the state, and let it be said now that this same team is coming back to play again in two weeks. DeNeffe and Baker were each in fine form, DeNeffe allowing but four hits and striking out seven men, while the best the all-stars could do was to get two hits off Baker, while he struck out five men. Jewett, at short, played a remarkable game for the locals, eliciting applause several times from the grandstand, while Smith and Henkle, left fielders respectively for the Colts and All-Stars, pulled off nice catches in the outfield.

This is how the scoring was done: The visitors got their one run in the sixth inning. Fisher, the first man up, went out, Jewett to Paine. Gray, next up, went out, Driver to Paine. Henkle singled and stole second. Campbell then hit one to Driver, who made a wild throw to Paine. Henkle scoring from second. Myers, next up, struck out, making the third man. That was all the scoring for the All-Stars, yet they came near duplicating the trick in the ninth.

The locals scored one in the second and as follows: Paine hit safely, stole second and was advanced to third on Jewett's out, and came home when Gray made a bad peg to home of Hardesty's grounder. Again in the third the locals annexed two more runs. Coleman was hit by a pitched ball, stole second and was advanced to third on Smith's clean drive over second. Smith stole second. Coleman then scored on a passed ball. Smith taking third, while Driver was striking out. Jewett then made first on Hathaway's error. Smith scoring on the same play. In the fifth inning the locals made their last run. Coleman, first up, struck out. Smith then hit one too fast for Campbell to handle, the ball also eluding Myers, and Smith raced around to third. He scored when Driver hit to Hathaway. Hathaway trying to head Smith off at the plate.

SMITHSON TIES THE RECORD

Portland Man Beats the Great Shaw in the Hurdles

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 15.—There never will be any more question as to who is the greatest hurdler in the world, for Forrest G. Smithson finished 10 feet ahead of A. B. Shaw, the American champion, Saturday, abreast of a heavy wind in the remarkable time of 15 1-5 seconds. The Multnomah Club man, always leading, finished up with a remarkable burst of speed, and had no topped a hurdle down would have held the 16 1-5 second record, held jointly by Shaw and Kraenzlein. At the same time Smithson sped over the course the wind was blowing in his face at about 20 miles an hour. Shaw also knocked down a hurdle, but from the gun there was only one man.
