PROF. CARSON'S SUCCESSOR IS SELECTED

Professor Edward A. Thurber, of the department of English at the University of Missouri, has been elected head of the department of rhetoric and American literature in the University of Oregon to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Professor Luella Clay Carson, who has left the University to assume the presidency of Mills College in California.

Professor Thurber was graduated from Yale in 1891. After a year spent in Paris at the Sorbonne and College de France, he returned to America, taking graduate work in English at Harvard University, and receiving his A. M. degree in 1894. He later took up the profession of teaching, in which he has made a great success. He was an instructor in English at Yale, leaving there to assume a more important position in the University of Missouri. He now comes to the University of Oregon as head of the department of rhetoric and American literature, a position considered one of the most important in the University. Professor Thurber will begin his work in September.

RESULTS OF SAN FRANCISCO'S PRIMARY

San Francisco, Aug. 18.—With the primaries over and the full vote counted, there are two results evident. One of these is that party organization cannot be eliminated from politics, as witness the selection of Crocker, Leland and McCarthy to head the Republican, Democratic and Union Labor tickets for the mayoralty fight. The other is that Francis J. Heney, in spite of the fact that he secured the Democratic nomination by a bare majority of 124 votes, and secured the Independence League nomination for the district attorneyship, which was practically overlooked in the shuffle, is far from being acceptable to the voters of San Francisco, and that he will have much more difficulty in securing his election than his people anticipate.

NO 8-TEAM LEAGUE FOR HIM

President of Spokane Club Can See Nothing But Northwestern

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 18.—"I would rather a thousand times be in the Northwestern than in the Coast League," says Joseph Cohn, president of the Spokane Club. "I see I have been mentioned as favoring this scheme of an all-coast organization. Now I want to say that I am president of the Spokane club and I would rather decide where we are going than others do the work for me. I am with Douglas, of Seattle, the best baseball manager in the country, when it comes to knowing what to do to keep the game going. When he says the coast proposition is not good, he knows what he is talking about. "Remember, the Coast League will not have its railroad rates next year, and think of what that means. The jump from Los Angeles to Spokane will be as far as from here to Minneapolis or St. Paul. It is prohibitive. I do not believe in running baseball for the benefit of the railroads, but in the interests of the community where we play. Between the cities of the Northwest we have a natural rivalry. It is the greatest natural league in the country. All such a circuit needs to make it successful is good baseball, and we are giving it."

THE COLTS ARE PRACTICING

Last night the Colts had another snapper practice in preparation for the big game next Sunday with the Portland team. The club, which has a great record this season, having won nearly every game on its schedule. Last Sunday with Taylor, their star epistolary artist, on the mound, they defeated the crack Kelso team 5-2. Taylor allowed but three scratch hits. He will pitch his Sunday against the Colts, while Ray Baker will be on the firing line against him. In the two games that Baker has pitched for the Colts this year the opposing teams have gotten but two hits off his delivery in each game—a grand record for a young pitcher.
