Yet through it all, by hook or crook, he toiled and wrote his matchless book! O, authors of the present day, whose books are dry as bales of hay, who grind "best sellers" by the ton, which last from rise till set of sun, who roll in comfort and ease, dictating stories by the ream, try Bunyan's plan—it may earn—and write a masterpiece in jail.

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HARRIMAN'S REMARKABLE PERSONALITY

"Master of human destinies am I," wrote John J. Ingalls, many years ago, for his subject "Opportunity." To rival the mastery of opportunity seems to be E. H. Harriman's ambition, to be the arbiter of fates and of kingdoms, to rule the industries and finances of the world, not so much for the money that would pour in to him but for the feel of power, the elation of dominance and mastery.

Considered purely as a brain, an organizing, planning and executive machine, Harriman is the marvel of this age, remarks an exchange. Whether malevolent or benevolent, he is one of the tremendous forces of modern life. His amazing and almost uninterrupted success has gained for him inexhaustible supplies of capital, which he may use as he wills, and already men supposed to be monarchs of millions of money and thousands of men, move merely as pawns in his game.

Harriman is not money-mad, but power-mad. If he had really rested in Europe, instead of fighting his physicians, discharging them and resuming his direction of affairs, his money might have gone on piling up indefinitely, but he missed the touch of the buttons, and the sensation of the vibrating levers which he controlled, so he went back to them. And so far as health is concerned, he was probably wiser than the doctors, for that labor which is a joy is a benefit, and the "rest" which irks is a detriment.

He returns to America still broken in health, but probably to continue as long as life lasts his career of railroad conquest.

Harriman is only a man, yet the limitations of ordinary men are not his, and he cannot be measured by the standards applied to other men. He must be considered as a force, and the incarnation of forces which direct him while he directs them. He is not a happy figure, this little man whose brain is sapping his bodily strength, but he looms colossal above men who sneered at him only a few years ago, and stands with Theodore Roosevelt and William of Germany as one of the three most remarkable personalities and powers in the world.

OREGON TOWNS MUST WAKE UP

Professor C. M. McKellips, of the Oregon Agricultural College, has returned from a trip East and, through the Corvallis Gazette-Times, gives the people of that town some advice that will apply to every other community in Oregon.

"We returned to Corvallis at night," said Mr. McKellips, "and really we were afraid to walk rapidly. The wooden walks are in such condition and the absence of light so inconvenient that I was inclined to make comparison, and truly, my little home, of which I had boasted, assumed much smaller proportions than it had in my memory. The following morning, as I walked over town, I came to the conclusion that I had never seen such disreputable looking streets. I certainly did not see them in the East in towns of this size. The 'tall uncut' growing up over the malks and standing at the sides of the streets covered with dust, made things look terribly forlorn. In the vicinity of Connersville, Indiana, I saw no towns even the size of Philomath that were not giving proper care to the sidewalks, and the streets, so far as keeping them free from weeds. Corvallis must get a hustle on. I have no desire to give advice unasked, but my summer's trip convinces me that in a civic way Corvallis has nothing of which it can boast, except mountain water, and while this is invaluable, it is not enough. Corvallis cannot afford to do less than put down cement walks over the entire city, fix up the parkings at the side, pave the principal streets, macadamize the remainder, and then put an electric light at every corner in the city."

The Ashland Tidings gives the following reason why it is so anxious to have Jim Hill hurry into the state of Oregon: "The city of Ashland received a carload shipment of copper wire for the new municipal light and power distributing system, all the way from Trenton, New Jersey. The freight charges on the shipment aggregated \$1020, \$548 of which represented the charges for the haul of four thousand miles across the continent from New Jersey to Portland, and \$472 the local tariff for the 341 miles from Portland to Ashland. Isn't it about time Jim Hill

was heading into Oregon with a competing railroad which it is hoped will lift the interior towns from freight bondage, as well as open up to railroad traffic that vast territory known as "Darkest Oregon," now shut out entirely from the rest of the world?"
