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ENTERPRISE WILL BE REWARDED

The Pacific & Eastern railroad, reaching out of Medford toward the big timber belt, has finally been purchased by Mr. Allen, a New York financier, and paid for in cash. This road was started by the Medford people and has had many vicissitudes, but the original stockholders have received every dollar they invested in it, and it is now being extended to its first proposed terminus. It places a large belt of timber directly tributary to Medford, and develops a rich country to the benefit of that hustling town, thereby rewarding the enterprise of the people who had faith enough in the project to put their money into it. The people of Eugene and Lane county will also win out in the end if they will begin work on the railroad from this city, down the Siuslaw to the sea. There is every reason to believe that no trouble will be experienced in financing the road after it is once actually begun, but at the worst it is a safe prophecy that if we begin it somebody will in the fullness of time complete it if our own resources fail. On the other hand, if we simply content ourselves with talking about it and refuse to show our faith in it by investing money in grading and rails and equipment, it will probably never be built and its prospective benefits will never be realized. Seventy-five thousand dollars will complete this road to Elmira and as much more will extend it to the Lake Creek country—a sum that should easily be raised in Eugene and along the line of the road. With this section built there are already ample assurances in the hands of the local promoters that funds to complete it to the coast will be forthcoming.

A short haul to the coast means the emancipation of Lane county from the grip of railroad monopoly, and the transportation facilities thus afforded will make a great manufacturing and jobbing city of Eugene.

This is a great prize to gain, and we may well bend all our energies in the direction of its accomplishment.

Eugene should be as enterprising and energetic as the smaller city of Medford.

Though "Tama Jim" does not put in a claim for all the credit, he "points with pride," in the yearbook of his department, to the increase from \$234,000,000 to \$411,000,000 in the agricultural balance of trade in this country since he's been running the grub department of the government. It would be interesting to know just what percentage of that is represented by increase in prices and what by increase in production.
