NO PERMITS FOR BRUSH FIRES BEING ISSUED

New Law Takes Matter Out of
County Clerk's Hands and
Provides for Wardens

People in Lane county seem to be doing just as they please in regard to setting out fires to burn slashings, as the new law passed by the last session of the legislature takes the matter of issuing permits out of the hands of the county clerk and places it with fire wardens to be appointed throughout the county, but so far none of the appointees have accepted, at any rate no permits have been issued by them. Dozens of applications have been received by County Clerk Lee for permits, but he has been unable to offer any satisfaction to the applicants, and they have gone ahead with their fires without the permits. Each applicant, however, is warned by the clerk that they must be careful and not destroy any more property than is necessary.

Forestry Board

The law created the state board of forestry, consisting of the governor, secretary of state, the state game warden, the state fish warden, a member of the State Agricultural College who has charge of the forestry work, and three persons to be appointed. The personnel of the board at present is as follows: Governor and Secretary of State Benson, State Game Warden Stephenson, of Forest Grove; State Fish Warden McAllister, of Portland; Forest Supervisor S. C. Hartman, of Roseburg; L. S. Hill, of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., of Eugene; E. R. Lake, of the O. A. C. at Corvallis, and E. P. Sheldon, of Portland. The last named is secretary of the board.

No Compensation

It is the duty of the forestry board to appoint state fire wardens, who SHALL serve, according to the wording of the law. An effort has been made to get a number of road supervisors in Lane county to act in this capacity, but it is hard to get them to accept for the reason that the law provides for no compensation. Some have absolutely refused to act, while others have said they will, but have leased no permits.

The closed season for setting out fires is between June 1 and October 1, and the penalty for setting out fires without permits is a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$500, or imprisonment of not less than 10 days nor more than three months. But if there is no one to issue permits what are the

farmers and woodmen to do? Many of them are setting out fires anyway, not taking the risk of prosecution. Not many are afraid of arrest on account of the present status of affairs.

"GOOD FAIRY"

CASE IN COURT
Husband Would Recover Property Given Away by Late Wife

Chicago, Aug. 26.—A strange story of how a good fairy, in the person of an aged woman, entered into the life of a house servant and her crippled brother is involved in a suit which is scheduled for decision in the probate court here today.

At the hearing of the queer case, Edward Morrison sought to know what had become of \$79,000 worth of stocks and bonds which his wife, Robena Morrison, possessed just before she died last May. Mrs. Kate Heller, the daughter of an elevator conductor, and her crippled brother, Carl Hauber, were called upon to explain. Mrs. Heller and her husband were arrested in Hoboken, N. J., June 17, just as they were about to board a liner to sail long visit in Europe. This is Mrs. Heller's story: "I knew Mrs. Morrison for nine years. I was called to her home to act as housekeeper for ten months. I left there in April. I first met her when she came to buy some lace I had made. She took an interest in my crippled brother and bought some lace he had made.

On July 5, 1908, she called me to a couch in her room. 'Dear, I have something for you,' she said. Then she went to a closet off the dining room and brought out a tin box. She opened it and handed me one package, telling me that it held \$79,000 in money, which was for myself. Then she took another package containing bonds valued at \$79,000, which she said I should give to my brother. She said:

"Here, my child, take this and keep it. Do with it as you wish and may God bless you and make you rich. I hope that you have much luck." I took the money and invested it, but the bonds I put back under the bed, because I thought Mrs. Morrison had a sister who might need them.

This remarkable story was corroborated by Mrs. Matilda Plinn, sister of Mrs. Heller. Mrs. Morrison was 66 years old at the time the gift was said to have been made.
