

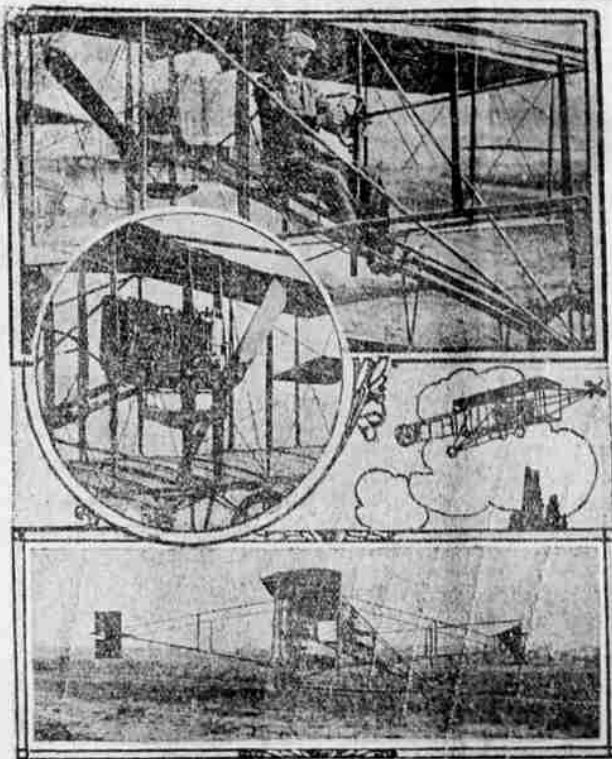
AMERICAN WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

CURTISS ENTERS CONTEST AT LAST MOMENT, EASILY OUTSAILING ALL COMPETITORS

Rheims, Aug. 28.—Curtiss won the International championship and aviation grand prize today. Curtiss came to his decision to make the trial suddenly. At 10:11 a. m., surrounded by a group of enthusiastic Americans, his machine was run out on the field. Curtiss made no other preparations than to put on a leather jacket. He ran the machine along the ground for a short distance for a short start, after which the machine was lifted and circled between the timekeepers and tribunes. Then, mounting gradually until it reached 45 feet, Curtiss crossed the line at terrific speed. He continued round after round at a uniform speed until the last round, when he let the motor out to full speed, and came home like a streak. A few seconds afterward the white ball was hoisted, indicating that the record had been broken. When Curtiss alighted he was showered with congratulations. He expressed perfect satisfaction at the way in which his aeroplane had behaved. His time was 7 min., 55 1-5 sec.

TRAGIC STORY OF OHIO TOLD BY SURVIVORS

Passengers Reach Vancouver After Their Harrowing Experience

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 28.—With her decks crowded with passengers in various stages of undress, the steamer Rupert City reached port at noon today, bringing 131 survivors of the Ohio wreck.

The passengers told of a terrible experience. Following the shock of the wreck and landing in the life boats, came a long wait for daylight, while the rain poured down, and men and women huddled together on the exposed rocks until the Vancouver fishing steamer Kingfisher came to their assistance, and every passenger and member of the crew join in their praise of the fishermen, who gave them every possible assistance and lent them clothing, afterward landing them at Swanson Bay. A grim note of tragedy was struck by the presence of a rough coffin on the upper deck, which contained the body of Wireless Operator George Eccles. The coffin was obtained at Swanson Bay, and a big bruise on his forehead shows that the man was struck by floating wreckage when he jumped from the liner. The disaster came with appalling swiftness, and thirty minutes after the Ohio had struck she went down, only her forecastle head and six feet of her smokestack showing above the water. Story of the Wreck As the liner was proceeding up Findlayson channel on Thursday night, bound for Alaska ports, rain storms came on and the weather became very thick. DEADLY AUTO RACES ARE ON AT BRIGHTON

One Driver Killed and Another Painfully Injured Last Night

Brighton Beach, Aug. 28.—The record for the first twelve hours of the 24 hour automobile race on the new autodrome track is one driver killed, one badly injured, another painfully burned and a policeman crippled.

During the night there were many spills which forced several cars to take trips to the camps for repairs.

alarm was spread that the vessel had struck a rock. Captain Johnson ordered full speed astern and the crippled vessel backed off the rock. She then steamed into Carter Bay, where she took the beach about two lengths from the shore, and work of transferring passengers to safety began. These men tried to rush the boats and only the sight of a revolver, backed by resolute seamen, kept them off. The boats were launched with difficulty and boatload after boatload were sent away to the beach, women and children going first, while some men took lifeboats and swam ashore. Meanwhile Operator Eccles had been sending calls for assistance, and Ketchikan got them. It was by staying at his post so long that cost Eccles his life. The last boat to leave the Ohio was overcrowded and twenty had to swim. Eccles and two freight clerks jumped overboard, and the clerks were picked up by a lifeboat. Eccles was struck on the head and drowned, but his body was recovered and taken ashore.
