CROP OF PRUNES IS VERY GOOD THIS YEAR

Secretary Williamson Says the Pear Crop Is Light; Apples Not a Full Crop

The crop of prunes in the state is said to be good this year, according to H. N. Williamson, secretary of the State Board of Horticulture, of Portland. He states, however, that the shipments of dried prunes this fall will be below the average annual shipment, as a large call is being met by the Oregon prune-growers for shipments of fresh prunes.

"The pear crop is unusually light throughout the state, with the exception of Southern Oregon," stated Mr. Williamson. "The Southern Oregon crop is fine, however, and holds up the average, commercially, of the entire state. The apple crop will also be light, with the exception that Southern Oregon will produce a fair crop this year. The grape crop is promising, although some time must elapse yet before the grapes are ready for picking."

"The next few days will tell the story of the hop crop in Oregon. With dry, clear weather there will be a fine crop, but a few days of rain now would prove detrimental. The vines are all light, but have a wealth of heavy burrs. The hops were not sprayed during the early part of the season on account of the prospect of low prices and, as a result, were hurt to some extent."

LEBANON ON MAIN SOUTHERN PACIFIC LINE

Colonel J. B. Eddy Is Busy Securing Rights-of-Way for Cut-off

Albany, Or., Aug. 29.—S. M. Garland, the lawyer, and J. B. Eddy, the S. P. right-of-way man, came down from Lebanon this morning in a private rig. Mr. Garland going to the Bay to spend Sunday. Mr. Eddy to Portland. Together they have been securing right-of-way for the Woodburn branch road which is to run from the Crabtree to Lebanon crossing the river at Lebanon, in order to save the bridge always going out heretofore used. They had gotten most of the Lebanon right-of-way, expending \$9,000 in the city already and were consulting with Jos. H. Raiston, of this city, in reference to property of his there. Several houses will have to be moved. Next week they will go into the country until the line is covered to Crabtree, crossing the Santiam near Lebanon at a good place. Then the road to Albany will be taken as far as Tollman, and thence on to Springfield, making Lebanon a way station, like Brownsville and the other towns on the road.

COTTAGE GROVE TRACTS IN DEMAND FOR FRUIT

Cottage Grove, Or., Aug. 30.—While the mountains and small valleys surrounding Cottage Grove are clothed with the finest timber in the known world, yet almost untouched by the lumberman's axe, fruit that cannot be excelled is being raised and many tracts are being set out in different varieties in this vicinity. Recently John Spray sold 134 acres of his farm, 1-2 miles from this city, to E. C. Lathrop, of Auburn, N. Y. Twenty acres are already set in winter apples and Bing cherries, and Mr. Lathrop expects to set nearly the entire farm in winter apples and pears. Mr. Greene, of Auburn, N. Y., purchased seven acres, the entire tract being set in fruit trees and berries. The James Lebow farm of 160 acres, 4-3-4 miles east of Cottage Grove, was purchased last week by the Porter Brothers, and almost the entire place will be set in different varieties of fruit this year. The Walden farm, owned by Porter Brothers and Stewart, adjoining this place, will have 40 acres set with winter apples and pears this fall. These two farms are to be irrigated from Mosby creek, a stream running through them. B. Denham purchased 22 acres of W. B. Cooper, one mile from the city, and will put 12 acres in orchard. Numerous farms and tracts of timber, as well as city property, are changing hands in Cottage Grove and the country surrounding it.
