STOLE SURVEYOR'S INSTRUMENT IN JANUARY. ARRESTED SATURDAY

J. S. Camp Bound Over to Circuit Court to Answer Charge of Larceny by Bailee

J. S. Camp, a man aged about 60 years, who worked in the office of the county surveyor of Lane county a while last winter, was arrested at Ashland Saturday upon a warrant charging him with larceny by bailee, alleged to have been committed last January, when he sold a civil engineer's transit belonging to Harvey Taylor, of Cottage Grove. A warrant was issued for his arrest at that time but he was not located until last week. The officers at Ashland informed Sheriff Bown of Camp's arrest there and he left Saturday night for the Southern Oregon city, returning home with the prisoner this morning.

Camp appeared in the justice court this forenoon and waived examination. His bond was fixed at \$800 and being unable to raise the bond was remanded to jail.

Camp is an intelligent appearing man. He stated in court this morning that he had no intention of committing a crime but just at the time he sold the surveyor's instrument he needed a certain amount of money to close a deal and expected to redeem the instrument in a day or so. But his deal went wrong and like many a man with a similar experience he is in the clutches of the law.

FIRE FIEND DESTROYS RESIDENCE ON EIGHTH STREET SATURDAY NIGHT

Occupied by Morris Harper and Family and Owned by Mrs. Heller

Fire Saturday night between 8 and 9 o'clock totally destroyed the residence occupied by Morris Harper and family and owned by Mrs. Heller, the mother of Sherman Heller, on West Eighth street, west of Blair street.

The origin of the fire is a mystery. No one was at home at the time and none of the contents were saved except a sewing machine and a few minor articles. The loss is between \$1500 and \$2000, with \$800 insurance on the building, held by the Oregon Fire Relief Association.

The blaze attracted a great deal of attention from the business streets and hundreds of people went to the scene of the fire, thinking it was the store building at West Eighth and Blair streets that was afire.

The firemen were slow in getting water on account of the distance from a hydrant. The building was almost consumed by the flames before a stream was finally played upon it.

YOUNG FRMER FINED FIFTY DOLLARS FOR KILLING TURTLE DOVE

Chas. Van Horn Violates State Game Law and Pays Dear-ly for His Mistake

Charles VanHorn, a young man residing some distance west of the city, was fined \$50 by Judge Bryson, of the justice court this morning for killing a turtle dove in violation of the state game law. VanHorn was seen to kill the dove by a neighbor and the officers of the Lane County Game and Fish Association were notified with the result that his arrest followed. He pleaded guilty and the judge imposed the minimum penalty.

The game and fish association has been instrumental in securing the arrest of several persons during the last few weeks on charges of game law violation and the members will be especially vigilant from now on, as there are reports of killing Chinese pheasants in this vicinity.
