UNWELCOME WOOPER SHOT BY FARMER

George Prine's Attention to W. G. M. Smith's Daughter Get Him Bullet in the Head

Albany, Or., Aug. 30.—Because Geo. Prine, his neighbor, had paid unwelcome attentions to the daughter of W. G. M. Smith, a farmer residing three miles south of Crabtree, Smith shot Prine at 9:30 o'clock Sunday forenoon. The bullet plowed a furrow in Prine's skull, but he is not believed to be seriously hurt.

Deputy Sheriff Green went out to investigate the shooting, but decided not to arrest Smith until the filing of a complaint. This may be done tomorrow, but it is possible that the case will await the action of the grand jury without any preliminary hearing.

Prine, who is a bachelor, has worked for many years on the farm of Mrs. Frank Smith, mother of W. G. M. Smith. A little more than a year ago trouble arose between Smith, who is 46 years old, and Prine, who is 44 years old, over attentions Prine is said to have paid Smith's daughter.

Smith believed Prine was "prowling around" on his farm last night and this morning went to his mother's place, which adjoins his, and waited for his enemy, who was hauling wood in preparation for the coming of a threshing crew. When Prine drove up on a wood wagon, Smith stepped out with a .38-caliber revolver and after some words Prine jumped off the wagon. As he struck the ground he stumbled, just as Smith fired at a distance of about ten feet. The bullet struck him on the top of the head, ranging downward and cutting a furrow along the skull for three inches, but not penetrating it. Prine fell forward unconscious and Smith returned home.

Dr. J. C. Booth, of Lebanon, was summoned, and removed half of the bullet which remained in Prine's head. This evening Prine is doing nicely, with no danger of serious results.

STATE POWERLESS TO STOP LOTTERY

Treasurer Steel Cannot See How Land Board May Offer Interference

Salem, Aug. 30.—"Since the transaction between the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company and the Oregon military road grant was purely a government transaction, I cannot see wherein the state has any right of interference in the lottery proposition of the Oregon Valley Land Company, wherein there is to be a drawing upon approximately 300,000 acres in agricultural lands in Lake and Malheur counties," said Treasurer Steel, the only member of the State Land Board in the city this afternoon.

It appears that the Oregon Valley Land Company purchased 500,000 acres of land in Lake and Malheur counties from the Booth-Kelly Company, and segregated 300,000 acres of the tract as agricultural, and is attempting to place it on the market, under the lottery system, at an average of \$200 per tract of from 10 to 1000 acres. E. T. Rehfield, of Guthrie, Okla., says the majority of the land is practically worthless, and proposes to appeal to the State Land Board to block the deal.

TRAINMEN DO NOT LIKE BLOCK SIGNAL SYSTEM

They Say It Is a Nuisance Where Traffic Is Not Very Heavy

The block system on the local Southern Pacific line is not necessary and causes much annoyance and loss of time to the passenger trains, is the statement made by a local trainman. When there is a freight in the Eugene yard on the main line a passenger coming from the south must stop at the block just outside the city limits; a flagman must take a flag and run several hundred yards down the track to flag any other train, while the passenger must wait after signaling the train in the yard for an answer to come ahead, and then for the flagman to come back before it proceeds. If it were not for the block system the train would come into the yards slowly and any other train on the track would give it the right of way without delay.

Where travel over a line is heavy, say three or four trains an hour, the block system is very valuable, but on a line where only half a dozen or so trains a day pass it proves quite a nuisance, say the trainmen.
