Jeffries Cables His Acceptance

San Francisco, Aug. 30.—Ratification of the action taken by Sam Berger in signing the articles with Jack Johnson in Chicago several weeks ago is the subject of a cablegram received today by Berger from Jim Jeffries, who is at present in Germany.

After the signing of the Chicago articles, in which numerous points in the contract between Jeffries and the colored man were agreed upon, Jeffries, in an interview in England, virtually repudiated Berger's action. Berger contended that Jeffries misunderstood what he had done, and today showed the following cablegram as proof that his action in Chicago was not unauthorized.

Carlsbad, Aug. 30.—Berger, San Francisco.—Agreement satisfactory. Inform newspapers your action authorized by me.—Jeffries.

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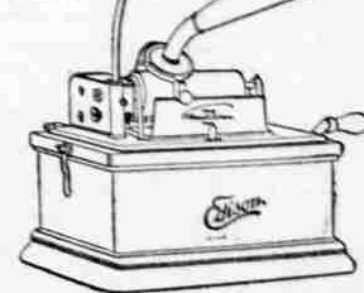
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
