PITTSBURG LEADS BOTH BIG LEAGUES

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 31.—Interesting baseball figures made public here tonight by the statistician of the Pittsburg baseball club show that the Pittsburg team to last Thursday leads both major leagues in the number of hits and runs scored, being the first club to get 1000 hits, and the first to make more than 500 runs. Pittsburg has 1001 hits and 511 runs to its credit.

Pittsburg and New York, of the National League are tied for first place in the number of home runs made this season, both teams having knocked 20, this being the record in both the major leagues. Tommy Leach, of the Pittsburg club, is the champion run-getter of the major leagues, having made 34.

Centralia, Wash., Aug. 31.—Centralia is now one of the busiest places on the coast. Theodore Hoss, of the Twin City electric road, has placed a crew of men in the south part of the city. Contractors are putting in bridges and waterways to carry off the surplus water to prevent the recurrence of last winter's flooding. F. A. Kesal, who has the contract for grading and paving several blocks, has a large force of men and teams at work. The double tracking of the Northern Pacific has placed several large camps of men near the city. The mill is putting on new men daily and the owners of the gravel pit are advertising for shovelers.

BLACK EAGLE MINE REPORTS BIG STRIKE

Albany, Or., Aug. 31.—The opening of the main vein of ore in the Black Eagle mine in the Santiam district has brought the news of a rich strike. The mining men of this district report that the ore will go \$400 to the ton. It was discovered Saturday. S. Y. Sorenson, of the Black Eagle mine, came to Albany last evening and created a stir when he began showing his sample of ore. The main vein follows the ridge for half a mile. The Black Eagle people have been working for several months in the hope of reaching the ore body.

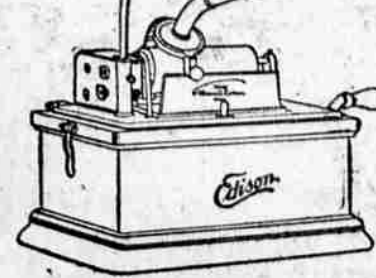
