

WHOUSE BOILER EXPLODES INJURING MANY PERSONS

San Francisco, Sept. 13.—Half a score were injured, several fatally when the boiler at the Lurline baths exploded today. Women patrons were blown through the windows of the building into the street, and the building was almost wrecked. A muffled roar shook the neighborhood just before noon and a cloud of steam and smoke belched forth, the boiler being blown into the street. From the second floor, where the individual bath rooms are located, men and women were blown through gaps in the walls and windows. Mrs. Eliza Eichler, an invalid recently discharged from a hospital, was picked up unconscious, and is not expected to recover. Her sister, Mrs. Joseph O. Benshaw-Pherte, was also severely injured. Three men were so badly hurt they were sent to the hospital. William Hansen, engineer, and J. Dennis, fireman, were blown through the front of the building and badly hurt. An unknown man, driving past, was cut and stunned by flying timber. His horse was instantly killed by a piece of the boiler. PEARY AND ONE ESKIMO ALONE REACHED POLE SO HIS COMPANIONS SAY

Battle Harbor, Sept. 13.—The following details of Peary's journey to the pole were gleaned from members of the expedition on board the Roosevelt:

"The only men to reach the pole were Peary and one Eskimo. The other white men of the various parties were sent back one by one as Peary daily drew nearer his objective point."

"On March 1 Peary left Cape Columbia with seven white men, seventeen Eskimos and one hundred and thirty-six dogs. The sun was seen for the first time March 5, and the observation showed the explorers to be a short distance from the 84th parallel. Bartlett kept ahead of the main party, breaking the trail. The ice was in fine condition and one day Bartlett made twenty miles. He took an observation at the 88th parallel on April 2, and then reluctantly returned, leaving Peary, Hansen and three Eskimos, with provisions for forty days, to make the final dash for the pole. On April 3 the party made twenty miles, sleeping near the 89th parallel. The ice was still good and the dogs in good shape. They made as high as 25 miles a day. The next observation was at 89.25, and the next two marches in a dense fog. The sun was sighted in 89.37, and the pole was reached April 6 and a series of observations taken at 90. Peary deposited his records there and hoisted the American flag. The temperature was 32 degrees below zero, Fahrenheit. The pole appeared as a frozen sea, and Peary tried to make a sounding, but got no bottom at 1500 fathoms. Peary stayed at the pole 34 hours, starting on his return April 7."

LOVETT SUCCEEDS HARRIMAN AS THE EXECUTIVE HEAD

Rockefeller and Schiff Made
Members of Executive
Board

New York, Sept. 13.—William Rockefeller and Jacob H. Schiff were elected directors of the Union Pacific railroad today, succeeding Henry H. Rogers and E. H. Harriman. They were also appointed members of the executive committee, and Robert F. Lovett was elected chairman of the executive committee to succeed Harriman.

The matter of selecting a president of the Union Pacific was not discussed at the meeting, but it is understood that the next head of the road will be an operating man.

THREE CHILDREN SHOT TO DEATH

Murder Without Any Apparent
Cause in Utica, New
York

Utica, N. Y., Sept. 13.—A murder for which no explanation can be found was committed last night, the victims being three Italian children of this city, Theresa Procipio, age seven; Fanny Infusino, three years old, badly wounded in the arm; Fred Infusino, aged two and one half years, shot in the bowels and died. The Procipio girl was instantly killed with a bullet in her heart. The children were talking with man about forty years old when he seen, and their bodies were found in a secluded spot. After Fanny Infusino revived she said a man took her little brother and she and the old girl tried to stop him and were shot.

SUTTON'S BODY WAS EXHUMED THIS AFTERNOON

Autopsy Tonight to Settle the
Question of Broken
Arm

Washington, Sept. 13.—The body of Lieutenant James N. Sutton, Jr., U. S. M. C., whose death has been the subject of consideration by two courts of inquiry, was exhumed today. An autopsy will be held tonight to determine whether his right arm was broken, thus making it impossible for him to have fired the shot that cost him his life.

NO POLITICS IN CENSUS WORK

Washington, Sept. 13.—Every measure is being taken by Census Director Durand for carrying out President Taft's determination to prevent political activity on the part of census supervisors and enumerators during their term of office, as emphatically outlined by the president's letter to Secretary Nagel, of the department of commerce and labor. Durand has sent a letter to all supervisors advising them that the order will be strictly enforced.

LEON LING SUSPECT CAPTURED IN TEXAS

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 13.—A Chinaman, believed to be Leon Ling, wanted for the murder of Elsie Rigdon in New York, was arrested here today. He will not talk.
