Six Hundred Dollars

expenditures will be learned. There
will be a good margin for the associa-
tion after all bills are paid, the di-
rectors say.

tions, showing the value of advertis-
ing for the fair was certainly well
advertised in the district as well as

**BOY BURGLARS WILL
BE RETURNED TO REFORM
SCHOOL AT WHITTIER, CAL.**

**Trio of Youthful Criminals Are
Caught—Escapes From
Reformatory**

In addition to the boy who was
caught at Junction City Saturday
with some of the goods on his per-
son stolen from the Irving store on
Thursday night, the other two impli-
cated in the crime were caught at Sa-
lem by Sheriff Minto Saturday night,
after Sheriff Harry Brown had tele-
phoned Minto that the boys were sup-
posed to be in Salem, and giving him
a description of them, together with a
description of the articles they had
stolen from the store. The boys were
brought to Eugene and lodged in the
county jail. Sheriff Brown wired to
the authorities of the state reform
school at Whittier, Cal., from which
the boys said they had escaped, and
received a reply that an officer would
leave there immediately for Eugene,
to take them back. One of the boys
is a Spaniard and his name is Ramo
Salazar. He is aged 16 years. The
name of one of the others is Willie
Ernest, and his age is 17, but the
name of the other is not learned. He
says his age is 16.

**UNSLIGHTLY FEED BARN
GIVES WAY TO MARCH
OF EUGENE'S PROGRESS**

Site for C. S. Frank's Fine
Brick for Department
Store Being Cleared

One by one the old unsightly build-
ings in Eugene's business district dis-
appear to make room for modern
business blocks. The latest to be
removed is the old feed shed at the
corner of Tenth and Willamette
streets which is being torn down to
make room for C. S. Frank's 2-story
brick block to be occupied by the AX
Bible Department Store.

Only the south 50 feet of the shed
is being torn down at the present
time, as that will be the width of the
new block, but Mr. Frank will per-
haps in the near distant future tear
away the whole structure. Thomas
Bailey will continue to occupy the
building until the first of October
when he will move to his stable
building across the street from the
Hotel Griggs. The Frank stable
building is spoken for and will per-
haps be occupied again as soon as
Bailey vacates it.
