The contractors say they are erecting buildings as fast as their men can get the materials. There are also a large number of real estate transfers being made. One firm Saturday sold 20 lots.

INDIAN HAD 18
UNTAGGED DEER HIDES

Perhaps the busiest man in Lane county this week was Grant Holcomb, deputy state game warden, who traced down "Jim Patt," a Warm Spring Indian, who had 18 untagged deer hides in his possession. The Indian claimed that he had bought the hides from different ranchers on the Mohawk, but was unable to give the names of any who he had done business with. However, he said he would go with the game warden to the houses where he had bought them and upon proof of guilt to the charges preferred against them by the game warden, each of the five men were arrested and taken to Eugene, where they were forced to pay a fine of \$50 each and costs. The hides were confiscated but we are informed the Indian was set free, as he had no money with which to pay a fine.—News.

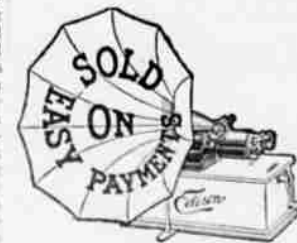
