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DEATH OF GOVERNOR JOHNSON

The death of Governor Johnson will cause a pang of regret throughout the nation. He was still a young man who gave promise of great usefulness to the plain people, one of whom he still remained, although by force of ability and integrity he had thrice been elected to the governorship of a great state.

Governor Johnson's life story would read like a romance in any country except America, still the land of equal opportunity, where industry may overcome poverty and natural ability weighs far more than social position or advantages of birth. Johnson's youth was surrounded by the direst poverty, his father a worthless drunkard, compelling the boy's mother to work over the washtub in order to support her children, until the future governor was old enough to take up the burden of labor himself. And yet this man, of foreign parentage, became governor of his state in the early thirties, won distinction and power, and gained the respect of the entire nation, without the assistance of wealthy or influential friends, and without resorting to the methods of the demagogue. His was a typical American career, ending all too soon, and bringing a touch of sorrow to political friend and foe alike, who feel that his death is a national bereavement.

The closing scene in the death chamber this morning was typical of the fortitude and tenderness which are the attributes of real manhood. Pressing, with faint and waning strength, his wife's hand against his cheek, he whispered:

"Well, Nora, I made a good fight, but I guess I've got to go."
As a man liveth, so shall he die.

The address of President Taft at Omaha yesterday rang true. It was his best and clearest utterance of the present tour. He says that he purposes to control the trusts and corporations in the interest of good government, and there is a ring of sincerity in his words. The plan of legislation the president suggests seems reasonable and gives evidence of having been carefully considered.

SHAKE-UP IN MINISTERIAL APPOINTMENTS

Dr. Rowland, at Last Moment, Asks to Be Relieved—Several Changes Made

Cottage Grove, Or., Sept. 20.—In all the history of Methodist conferences it is doubtful if there ever was a greater "shake-up" in the list of pastoral assignments at the last minute than occurred here this morning. Bishop Smith had virtually completed his work when Rev. B. F. Rowland, for four years superintendent of Salem district, arose, without any previous warning, and asked to be released from his position and the work of the ministry for one year. He gave business as his reason. His request was granted, and as the north-bound train was nearly due there was scarcely any time in which to work out a system of adjustment to fit all the problems that arose.

He abandoned his church work and took up the study of law, and built up a large practice. For many years he has been interested in politics, and has worked hard for the success of the Republican party. In 1906 he was elected lieutenant governor, and was re-elected in 1908.

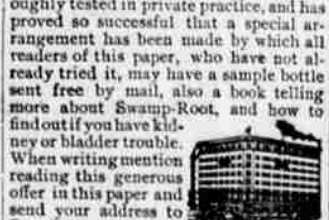
