NEWS OF FLORENCE AND WESTERN LANE

Public Schools Opened Last Monday—Shipping and Other Notes

The steamer Roscoe returned Friday after an absence of several weeks at Astoria.

The schooner Sausalito went to sea yesterday with a cargo from the Oregon and California Lumber Co.'s mill.

Miss Fannie Colvin came in from Eugene Saturday to resume her work as teacher in the Florence school for the coming year.

Aubrey Bomb has gone to Port Stevens, Oregon where he has taken a situation under contract to remain eighteen months.

Sheriff Bowen has offered a reward of \$200 for the arrest and conviction of the burglars who looted the store and postoffice at Aune on August 29.

A pair of horses belonging to John Saffley were drowned here Monday forenoon by backing off the wharf into the river.

The steamer Roberts was at work Wednesday pulling Kyle & Sons' logs off the mud flat above town. The logs have been stored in the boom there for a year or two past and the tides do not rise high enough these days to float them into deep water and thence into the mill boom.

The schooner Sausalito arrived here Friday from San Francisco after a cargo of lumber from the Oregon & California Lumber Co.'s mill.

The Washco returned from San Francisco yesterday. She brought in some merchandise and will take out another cargo of lumber.

A few silver salmon have been caught in the river during the past few days and it is probable there will be a large run from the ocean before long.

An adjourned meeting of the port commissioners was held at their office last Saturday but no business of importance was transacted. A transcript of the proceedings was prepared recently and submitted to Morris Bros., of Portland, in connection with the bond deal. They submitted the documents to their Chicago attorneys for an opinion and this had not arrived at that time.

The public schools of Florence opened Monday morning for a nine-months' term. Miss Lillian McVicker, of Corvallis, is principal, and teaches the high school; Miss Fannie Colvin has charge of the intermediate grades and Miss Gertrude Schreuders has the primary department. Miss Colvin is the only one of the teachers who taught here last year, but Miss Schreuders has been in charge of the primary department for two years previous to this. Several pupils have been enrolled for the eleventh grade but will not commence work for a few days on account of lack of text-books. —Florence West

STREETCAR LINE EXTENSION MILE AND HALF LONG

Cars Expected to Be Running by First of October—Opens Up Valuable Property

The Moss avenue and Fairmount Heights extension of the local street railway line will be 3140 feet, or over a mile and a half long, when it is completed. Fifty men and ten teams are now rushing work on the line, and Manager Lambirth expects to have cars running over it from the Masonic cemetery to the main line at the corner of East Thirteenth street and Moss avenue by the first of October. One car of rails for the line left Vancouver, Wash., on the 15th inst and two cars left on the 17th. They are expected in some time today and will at once be hauled to the scene of building operations. The last of the ties for the line were delivered yesterday, and are being laid today. The trolley poles and wires will at once be erected, and as soon as the rails are laid the road will be ready for the cars.

The new line extends the full length of Moss avenue and turns west on Fairmount boulevard past the Svarverud residence on the hill, crosses the hill to its south side, thence extends across the hollow to the James place, passing through his orchard. Just before the James place is reached there is a trestle 160 feet long with fills at each end. From the James place the line extends southerly and soon swings to the west, passing through Elder Jas. Moore's place and one or two others, joining the cemetery line at the foot of the Masonic cemetery hill.

The new line will open up some very valuable residence property which has heretofore been kept off the market for the reason that it was comparatively inaccessible. After the line is in operation a half-hour car service will be the means of selling this slightly property for residence purposes.
