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ILLUMINATIONS OF CARNIVAL BIG SUCCESS

News and Gossip of Past Week in the Great Metropolis

New York, Oct. 2.—No feature of the Hudson-Fulton celebration which is now at its height has attracted more attention or evoked more praise than the decorative illuminations. These have been carried farther than ever before in a public festival. The nights are gilded by millions of electric lights, both arc and incandescent, by magnesium torches, flash lights and searchlights of a power hitherto unknown. The illuminations extend from Staten Island along the shore of the Bay and far up the Hudson River.

In the Washington Heights neighborhood great pillars of fire, forty in number and each 120 feet high, formed by throwing the most brilliant searchlights on columns of steam and smoke, make the river radiant for many miles.

The culminating point of brilliance will be reached on October 9 when beacon fires will burn on every hilltop and many other available places from the Narrows to the head of navigation on the Hudson, the blaze to continue for three solid hours.

The eyes of the nation naturally turn toward New York's mayoralty campaign, which is beginning to wax warm despite the engaging festivities of the Hudson-Fulton celebration. Next to the President of the United States the Mayor of New York is the most important elective officer in the country. The population of the city is now greater than the total population of the United States when Washington was inaugurated. The city's total annual expenditures are little less than the total revenues of the Federal Government at the close of Hayes' Administration. Its gross debt equals the interest-bearing national debt. Its assessed valuation represents one-fifth of the estimated wealth of the United States. Its public works are surpassed in size and cost only by those of the United States Government. The character of New York City's government influences the character of every other city government in the country.

To be Mayor of New York is to hold an office that is worthy of any man's time, talents and ambition. He must deal with the most complicated problems of municipal government known to the civilized world, and it is no task for respectable mediocrity.

All these points seem to have been considered by the leading parties in making their nominations and each is making a strong appeal to the independent vote. Once an independent ticket came within 3,000 votes of being elected Mayor of New York and there are many more independent voters now than there were then.

Under an arrangement now being effected for the management of the E. H. Harriman estate, Mrs. Mary Harriman, the dead magnate's eldest unmarried child, will become the greatest woman farmer in the United States, if not in the world. She now virtually has control of Arden Farm, consisting of 25,000 acres. Already she has taken hold of the task with characteristic Harriman energy and skill. She is directing personally the unfinished work of roadmaking, the terracing of hills, landscape gardening, etc. Just as had been planned by herself and father jointly. In a smart trap drawn by a highstepping cob, she daily drives over the farm, giving instruction in detail to the foreman of nearly four hundred men now at work.

Miss Harriman, from early girlhood, has been extremely fond of country life. She has never cared particularly for society. Although regarded in the circle of the "Four Hundred," she has preferred to devote herself to a more serious career. For several years she has actively

participated in settlement work in the city. Among her most notable charities is the ferryboat in the North River for consumptives.

One of the most interesting of the foreign visitors to the Hudson-Fulton celebration is Princess Kuni, whose husband is officially representing his cousin, the Mikado of Japan. The Princess, like her husband, is quite Western in her dress, in spite of her typical "Jap" type of beauty. The Parisian toilettes which she affects, do not make a little lady look other than the most charming Japanese belle, and one realizes how much more characteristic would be a kimono. The princess, like her consort, has come in touch with western civilization more than most of her compatriots. The prince is quite cosmopolitan, having been educated in Germany.

When ex-Police Commissioner Theodore Bingham first began in one of the magazines his expose of conditions existing in the police department and certain branches of the New York courts, public opinion was divided into two classes—friends of the police and judges who said "cold feet" and opponents of the city administration who believe that wrong doing is allowed to continue undisturbed in many parts of the city. Even Tammany Hall is unable to explain the report of the commission appointed by Mayor McClellan to investigate the affairs of the night court. This report discloses conditions which are perilous to the public and a reproach to the administration of justice. The extent to which the illegal practice of releasing prisoners on parole has been carried by certain of the city magistrates is indicated by the statement that the commission found 123 cases in which persons were discharged after commitment. Of those persons forty were released by one magistrate who has since been removed from the bench, and thirty-one by another who has resigned. Thirty-five of the prisoners thus set free were old offenders who had previously been sentenced to prison from two to ten times, and it is stated by commission that in a vast majority of the cases investigated there is absolutely no documentary evidence on file to justify the action of the magistrates in disposing of them.
