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Wm. E. Curtis, the famous special correspondent of the Chicago Record-Herald, gives Corvallis, as a "village," a very black eye in his later describing the Oregon Agricultural College. In a letter to his paper, dated September 29, he says: "The Agricultural College of Oregon, situated in the village of Corvallis, sixty-two miles south of Portland, is entitled to the first prize for order and neatness, and may be judged from all points of view. In comparison with the college, the town is ill-kept and ragged, but improving in appearance, and Mr. Kline, secretary of the Commercial Club, declares that if we come back here next year we will find a very different-looking place. The people are mowing down the weeds in the gutters and roadways, they are fixing up their doorways and repairing their fences; they are painting their houses and trimming their trees, paving the streets and building sidewalks. Corvallis is purely agricultural town of slow growth, but is surrounded by a very fertile country, capable of raising large crops of grain and fruit and vegetables, and I am told that the farmers are rich. But they do not have much pride in appearances, and the neighborhood might be made much more attractive than it is."

Regarding the publication of fictitious names of the students suspended from the University for hazing, no self-respecting newspaper or reporter could be party to the conspiracy. The State University is a public institution, supported by the money of all the people, and they have a right to know the real facts in an important matter like this one in question. The hazing episode is only aggravated by such deception, and the moral and intellectual standing of the student body is lowered in the estimation of the people when such a presumptuous attempt is made to fake the press of a great state. It would have been better for the students found guilty to have taken their punishment like men, instead of attempting to draw the entire school into complicity with their wrong-doing. This experience alone will be worth more to those particular students than a year's schooling. It will teach them to respect the confidence and trust such employment carries with it.

FRESHMEN ARE ROASTED FOR LACK OF SPIRIT

Upper Classmen Say It Is the "Bummiest Class in History of University"

The class of 1913 received a scathing denunciation from the upper classmen this morning at the student body meeting at the University for their lack of "Oregon spirit" so far shown. The remarks were characterized by such statements as the "bummiest class in the history of Oregon," or "shameful," "disgraceful." However, with the sting of these remarks still in their ears, the freshmen held a meeting at which it was the unanimous opinion that they were not lacking in "Oregon spirit" and would show to the school that they would take part in all affairs.

The regular student body assembly that was to have been held on the second Wednesday in October, was held today because of conflicting dates next week, and routine business was taken up.

Three amendments to the student body constitution were read for the first time. One was to prevent athletes of previous years from voting for captains, and that only those who had secured their "O" be allowed to vote. This means that only athletes who have taken active part during the season can vote for next year's captain. Another, to allow more freedom in the auditing accounts, will strike out the provision that all student body accounts be audited at the University office. The third was to change the name of the Oregon Weekly to the Oregon Emerald and that it be hereafter published as a semi-weekly. These amendments will be read and voted on at a special meeting two weeks from today. A committee on ushering was named as Fritz Dean, Cecil Eddy, John Kelly, Francis Curtis and Tom Burke.

At the freshmen boys' meeting that followed the Oregon spirit began to manifest itself and after earnest talks by several upper classmen the freshmen warmly expressed their willingness to take part and several thrilling yells were given to show that they knew how to do so. The following athletic officers were elected for the freshmen events in football and track: Lloyd Barzee of Portland, football manager; Robert K. Kendall of Eugene, track captain; Harold Warner of Pendleton, track manager.
