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THOSE RAILROAD PROPOSITIONS

Mr. Carver is again before the people of Eugene with another railroad proposition which, reduced to its simplicity is that if the people here will put up \$40,000 and the right of way, he will build and equip a steam railroad from Eugene to Elmira, \$8000 to be paid over with the completion of each three miles of road. In other words, Mr. Carver agrees to do for \$40,000 and the right of way what the Lane County Asset Company (local) agrees to do for \$150,000. Provided he will do as he agrees, Mr. Carver's proposition is far better for this city than that proposed by the Asset company, for there would be much more certainty of further extension of the Carver line as of the Asset line for the reason that either, with the fifteen miles built, could secure funds for building on to the coast or to Coos Bay.—Register.

This matter of getting a railroad to the coast is so important that The Guard has no desire to engage in a controversy with another local paper, thus engendering bad feeling that will tend to divide the community on the question even more than it has been, but this statement is so manifestly unfair and casts such a direct reflection upon those who are taking an interest in the affairs of the Lane County Asset Company that it demands some attention.

That Mr. Carver wants only \$40,000 for doing what the Lane County Asset Company asks \$150,000 for is absolutely false. The latter ask the people to subscribe \$150,000 to justify the beginning of work, pledging themselves to build not only fifteen miles of road, but as much of the road as this sum will construct, perhaps twenty-five or thirty miles. When it is built the people, who are stockholders in the Asset Company, will own the road.

Mr. Carver agrees to build only fifteen miles for \$40,000, and when it is completed the people who put up the money will have no interest in the road.

The Asset Company has good reason to believe that when they have raised sufficient money to begin work with, they will not lack for funds to continue the road to the mouth of the Siuslaw and on to Coos Bay. Mr. Carver gives no promise of even an effort to construct the road beyond Elmira. This is the most objectionable feature of the Carver proposition, since its acceptance might block for all time the route to the coast, and lock Eugene up tighter than ever before.

The Guard is not unfriendly to Mr. Carver, and if there was no other proposition with which his conflicted would favor it on the broad ground that Eugene could afford to pay \$40,000 for fifteen miles of new railroad in almost any direction out of the city. At this time, however, it complicates matters and will probably result in the defeat of all pending propositions by dividing the efforts of the community. This is no doubt the reason for its advocacy by the Morning paper, which seems for some reason to be against any railroad project, and which has heretofore opposed all Mr. Carver's propositions and on every occasion expressed its lack of faith in him. That it should look upon his proposition now so favorably and take occasion to place the local people interested in the Asset Company in a bad light at the same time, would indicate that the Carver scheme is being advocated for the purpose of side-tracking the Eugene-Siuslaw-Coos Bay project.

The Guard knows that the men most prominent in the affairs of the Lane County Asset Company, Messrs. Svarverud, Rodman, Dunn Hampton, Fellman, Johnson, Ness, Roberts, Berger, Campbell, Anderson and many others, have no motive in view but the good that will accrue to the city and county in the construction of a railroad to navigable water, and their standing in the community as business men entitles their efforts to at least decent consideration. They surely should not be misrepresented and placed in a false light as a reward for all the time and money they have spent during the past year in an effort to secure needed railroad facilities for Eugene.

Up in Washington they have a four-years' course in journalism in the State University. Evidently there is need of something of the kind in the Oregon institution.
