The Eugene High school football team has been going through a few nights of very severe bucking. The prospects of the team are very good. The men are heavy, the team has a good nucleus of experienced players and a good coach, and the boys feel that it lies with them to make a successful season. The team will be well-balanced, for the line is heavy and the back field fast. So far little work has been done, and the knowledge of the fact by the boys gives them an impetus to make up for lost practice that will last. A full second team is turning out every night that is nearly as strong as the first. Fred Moulton, Oregon's famous player, is coaching them this year, and he is one cut get them down to a working basis in machine-like form. But it is their spirit of determination that is making them go through daily practice that is as severe as the average game.

Jenkins (captain) and Bradshaw, new student, who played last year with Dallas, will do the kicking this year. Jenkins was the team's strong man in this line last year, and the latter is his equal. Sems, a husky lad from the mountains, who played for a short time last year, is back. Almore, a last year's star, is making sensational plays at left end, while Morrison is sharing his glory at the right end. Dustin, who played quarter part of the time last year, is

most on that place. Pengra, Porter, Koch and Noland all well-known for their work last year, are back. Scott, a man from the East, is showing his ability at right half. Epps, another new man, is apt to make good over some of last year's men.

The games for this year are all hard, but are essential because of the two defeats last year. Salem, of course, is Eugene's mortal enemy and over a hundred rooters from there are expected here when the team plays on Thanksgiving day. Salem claims its team is remarkably strong this year, but a line can be had on it when it plays Willamette a week from Saturday. The boys are counting on a big game with the Willamette freshmen game week from Saturday, but the freshmen are stronger than has been expected. They will have a line on Portland's strength from their game with the varsity freshmen this week. They will not play Pendleton, as has been talked of.

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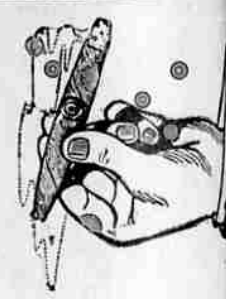

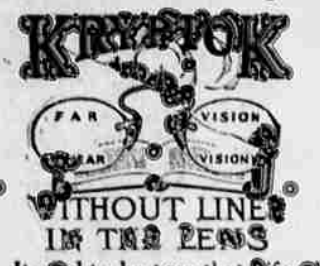


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
