Oregon's defeat at the hands of the alumni Saturday afternoon was the best thing that could have happened to the team, for it showed them their weak points. It took away their over-confidence from them, and the thought of it will serve as an impetus for hard practice and snappy playing the whole season. The team played very well as a whole, despite any adverse criticism. For the first time of the season and with less than two weeks' training it was remarkable. Their opponents were the best that the varsity has ever turned out; besides the fact that several of them are in training, some holding positions as coaches and others playing with Multnomah.

Oregon, however, was weak in several places. The most serious of these was the back up. There was not enough spirit to the play. As a result of the Freshman-Lincoln High game four freshmen have virtually made places on the first team. They are Bailey, Mitchell, Walker and Kay. The latter two may play with the first team only part of the time. Freshman Walker, playing halfback, gave a splendid exhibition, showing remarkable headwork and fast and aggressive playing, being good yardage on straight line backs several times.

Miller, who weighs 240 pounds, brought the cheers from the grandstand and laughter at the way he walked through the High school line almost at will. He showed much more speed than ever before. Kay, a place kicker, has a future. Not once Saturday did he fail. Mitchell, at center, made a splendid showing in the manner in which he went through the line again and again.

DEBATING LEAGUE HAS PROVEN A BIG SUCCESS

Will Play More Important Part in High School Enterprises Than Before

High school debating this year promises to be a more important part of academic student enterprises than ever before, due to the success of the High School Debating League carried on with the aid of the University of Oregon. Professor De Cou, This result is highly pleasing to the University. It was started two years ago somewhat as an experiment. The object of the league is twofold. The first is to serve as a preparatory course for future work that can be done in the University, giving the student four years of actual work rather than having to spend a year or so in learning the first principles of public speaking and debate. The other is far less important and more of a feature of the enterprise than an object that the bringing of good debates to the University of Oregon.

A number of schools have already applied for admission to the league and the prospect is excellent for a large increase in the number of schools participating, and for greater efficiency as a result of the last two years' experience. At the annual meeting at the State Teachers' Association at Albany in July, Superintendent A. M. Sanders, of Albany, was elected president and Professor E. De Cou, of Eugene, secretary-treasurer.

At the same time an important change was made in introducing the triangular system in district debates where the conditions permit of it. The plan is essentially the same as that now in successful use by the Universities of Washington, Oregon and Idaho. As an illustration, assume a district containing nine schools grouped into three groups of three each. Each school in the triangular group will prepare an affirmative and a negative team on the same question, the affirmative team to debate at home and the negative team with one of the other two schools. The winning school of the group will be the one receiving the largest number of points, counting one point for each judge's vote, and an additional one for the decision, making a possible maximum of eight points for one school. A similar grouping of the three successful schools would determine the district championship. It has the advantage of doubling the number of students engaged in debate, and at the same time balancing the inequalities of a one-sided question or the likely to arise from prejudiced judges.

The state question for 1909-10 is: "Resolved, That the voters of Oregon should give their endorsement to the proposed law for state guarantee of bank deposits."

The district questions are as follows:

Eastern Oregon, Superintendent J. S. Sanders, Pendleton, director—"Resolved, That the commission for city government should increase of efficiency and decrease of corruption in city offices."

Columbia River District, Superintendent W. W. Wiley, Newberg, director—"Resolved, That life imprisonment, as restricted power of pardon, should be substituted for capital punishment in Oregon."

Central Oregon District, Superintendent A. K. Mickey, Junction City, director—"Resolved, That the national should reduce their armaments to the maximum necessary for police duty."

Southern Oregon District, Superintendent R. R. Turner, Grants Pass, director—"Resolved, That the system of single tax, as advocated by Henry George, should be adopted in Oregon."

Cosco County District, Superintendent A. G. Roab, North Bend, director—"Resolved, That postal savings banks should be established by the federal government."
