CITY OF ST. JOHNS DECLARED WET

Salem, Or., Oct. 13.—Through an opinion written by Associate Justice Will R. King, the supreme court today announced an opinion in which it is held that the charter of the city of St. Johns is very similar to that of Medford in that it is superior to the local option law. The St. Johns charter is held to be a special act authorized by an amendment adopted by the initiative in 1906 by which the power is conferred upon the city council of St. Johns to regulate the sale of liquor.

ROBBERS BREAK INTO HARRISBURG DEPOT

Harrisburg, Or., Oct. 13.—The Southern Pacific depot at this place was broken into last night by robbers and the office and freight house ransacked for valuables. A careful checking is being made, but so far nothing of any value is missed. There is no clew.

Salem, Or., Oct. 13.—General Manager J. P. O'Brien of the Hartman lines in Oregon has informed the railroad commission that Latham, Lane county, will be made a flag station for numbers 19 and 20, the Roseburg local, in response to a petition of the people who live near that point on the Southern Pacific.

The citizens of Glendale also have petitioned the railroad commission for depot improvements including lights.

OBITUARY.

George M. Hammett was born June 20, 1864, and died September 30, 1909, aged 45 years, 3 months and 10 days. He was born near Eugene, being the fourth child.

He also spent several years in other mines in the Western states. In 1892 he came for a visit with his parents after which he returned to the mine in British Columbia and Montana. In 1901 he was called home by the death of his father and the serious illness of his brother Paul, who died a month later. Shortly after this he fled Alaska, from there he went to the Panama zone. Of his years he has lived in different parts of California, mostly in San Francisco and Downsville, near where he died.

He was kind hearted, jovial disposition and a general favorite of all friends and relatives. He leaves a kind, loving mother, who will greatly miss his frequent letters home. Also several brothers and sisters, all of whom were present at the funeral.
