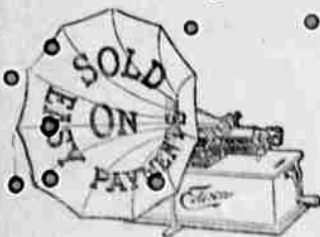

IN THE
World of SportPHEASANTS MAY BE
KILLED TOMORROW
Season Opens at Midnight To-
night—Can Kill Only
Males

The season for shooting Chinese
pheasants opens at midnight tonight
in Oregon, with the exception of the
four counties where these birds are
protected absolutely, Jackson, Jo-
sephine, Hood River and Malheur.

The season extends from Octo-
ber 15 to November 15 for killing male
Chinese pheasants, with certain re-
strictions placed on the number of
birds to be killed each day, and each
even days.

The new game laws, as enacted by
the legislature, now make it a misde-
meanor to kill a Chinese pheasant
hen, and for that reason the hunters
will have to be more careful than
usual. Heavy penalties are imposed
for infractions of this law, and for
violation of any of the provisions of
the game law code. The new law in
regard to killing females is not, how-
ever, regarded with disfavor by the
sportsmen. They realize that the law
is the best thing for the propagation
of the birds, and the best sportsmen
have not, even in past years, when
there were no legal restrictions, kil-

ed hens, which were the time
of the opening of the season moth-
ering their young. The new law makes
the possession of the feathers of hens
prima facie evidence that the females
have been illegally killed.

Another change in the code is in
the limit of the number of birds
which may be killed. This year but
five pheasants may be killed in one
day and ten in any seven consecutive
days. The limit for grouse is the
same as for native pheasants.

OREGON CO-EDS
MUST PLAY TENNIS

Dr. Stuart, the new ladies' physical
instructor at the University, is a ten-
nis enthusiast, and has made tennis
compulsory for "co-ed" physical
training. Last spring three excel-
lent courts were built exclusively for
the girls' tennis association. Since
the game has become remark-
ably popular with the women of the
University. Two years' physical
training is compulsory for both men
and women and Dr. Stuart believes
that tennis courts and outdoor exer-
cises are preferable to gymnastic
work.

News Notes.
The immense amount of building
that is going on in Springfield and
Eugene is keeping the retail depart-
ment of the saw mill with its hands
full. Between 30,000 and 40,000
feet of lumber are going from this
department every day. The office
force is having to work "night
shifts" to keep up with this record-
breaking pace.

Thirty or forty men did not come
back to work at the mill Tuesday
after pay day. Although it is cus-
tomary for a few men to quit as soon
as they are paid, this number is un-
usual. It can be explained perhaps,
by the fact that the new railroad
work has brought a more transient
class that never stay with one job
for two or three days. The vacant places
were quickly filled for men are very
plentiful this winter.

City Council Does not Look
With Favor on Obstruction
to Alley—Other Matters

The city council at its adjourned
session last night passed the busi-
ness that was left over from the regu-
lar meeting Monday night and it
took a greater part of the evening to
do it.

An important matter acted upon
was temporary frame building set
up in the alley next to Yoran's shoe
store for a cigar store while the Gold-
smith-Watson building is being erect-
ed. It was ordered removed.

The city attorney and recorder
were ordered to make a statement
of the finances of the city.

Councilman Garret reported that
a small piece of land in Springfield
had been bought in which to erect a
tower for the electric power trans-
mission line.

The street commissioner was di-
rected to keep account of all cars
contract with the intention of en-
forcing the forfeiture clause for de-
lays. It was reported that the con-
tractors were found with street work
and it was decided to buy up mat-
ters before the fall rains set in.

The plat of Fairmont Heights
was rejected because certain streets
did not conform to the old streets.

The plat of Hendricks & Luckey's
addition was again returned for cor-
rection.

An ordinance levying an assess-
ment for paving of Pearl street from
Sixth to West Eleventh was passed.
The cost of the whole improvement is
\$10,762.21.

An ordinance assessing the im-
provement of West Eleventh street, from
Jefferson to Monroe, was read and
passed, as was the ordinance for de-
velopment of the line from Thirteenth
street to Eleventh street.
