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IN REGARD TO STUDENT BODY TAX Former High School Students Defend the Present Plan

Editor Guard:—The Register has used much of its space since Sunday condemning the methods of the Student Body Association of the High School because it refuses to admit a student to its membership who does not pay his or her share toward the support of the association's activities in the form of an annual membership fee, which is \$1.50. If the morning paper wishes to condemn this method, it should not single out the University of Oregon, which not only uses the same method, but practically requires the payment of this fee by calling it part of the registration fee, and here the cost of membership is \$5.75. Instead of wasting out the paper, let it ask why does not the paper condemn all the schools of the state as a whole, because this is the common method? And it is right.

Student body enterprises, such as athletics, literary publications and debate, must be carried on by some organized body that will not discriminate between their support according to their personal likes and dislikes. Hence, associated student associations. The body carries out the will of the majority of its members, and if it votes to carry on a certain branch of athletics, the cost of this is borne as a whole by the body, which is no more than the majority rule.

Until two years ago this support was carried on by taxes. These were levied and were collected with difficulty, resulting that the total of the taxes levied amounted to far more than if each had paid a little but his share. This is the liberal minded or loyal students had to pay for the narrow minded of others. Furthermore, it was noticed that those who paid were as a rule those most able to pay.

After investigating the method of other schools the whole student body adopted unanimously the present plan.

In this way the glee club, the debate or athletics or whatever the enterprise, is allotted just so much and knows its bounds. Formerly the enthusiastic managers of each enterprise often spent a great deal more money than necessary, depending on his appeals for aid to the students afterward.

The point made by the morning paper of separating the "black sheep" seems ridiculous. The association's meetings are held after school hours and those non-members who are interested and wish to remain are asked to sit apart from the others only to facilitate voting, as visitors to any other association or club might be asked to do.

In general it seems strange that those who do not wish to do their share toward the support of student activities should ask to help direct them.

Ed. Guard:—In Sunday's Register occurred an editorial concerning the

payment of student body taxes in the "prep" schools of Oregon. The article was aimed directly at the Eugene High's \$1.50 tax, so take Eugene High as an example. The paper has social activities, a publication, three branches of athletics, debating and other activities, which could not be supported without a student body fund. Under the conditions of the adoption of the present system, a subscription list was passed around with unfailing regularity and about 25 or 30 students signed up and supported the activities while the whole school derived the benefit. When a manner failed, every time a call arose for money, \$1.50 or one tax value of collecting such a tax from about 400 students, it came from 33 to 38, can be realized only by one who has actually tried to collect it. Perhaps a 3-room country school house can be run in this way, but the school the size of the Eugene High cannot.

Finally it became a necessity to adopt some system to raise finances and the one adopted is in accordance with that of all other schools. The \$1.50 tax is not a compulsory one. The point brought out in the editorial was that a student not paying the tax should not be kept out of student body meetings. In other words the student not paying his tax should have as much to say in disposing of the funds as one who did pay his tax. Such an idea is contrary to all economic principles. Under this idea who would pay a tax?

The illustration in the editorial about the "widow" was not even a parallel case, and it is only to appeal to prejudiced minds, for the widow, knowing that she would receive no benefit, would not pay the student body tax, nor would she be under obligations to do so. It is fair that her children, who did not pay the tax, should not be what should be done with the funds that other students pay in?

The University of Oregon has a student body tax which is practically compulsory. So have other schools. Why does the Register not complain of that? The morning paper will have some difficulty in getting its theories to support practical systems in use in our educational regime, and will use have to use some other method than burying its point in a mass of praises on our present educational system, as it has done in this editorial. The individual suggesting the editorial must either have a woeful lack of knowledge of practical student body affairs, or must have been grossly misinformed.
