BOURNE ANNOUNCES

HE WILL RUN AGAIN

Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., officially and publicly announced himself as a candidate for re-election today. The statement came while the two Senators were in conference with the Chamber of Commerce over the needs of Oregon. Here is how the announcement was made.

"There is a constantly growing sentiment in favor of Oregon in the East. One of the greatest financiers in the United States, among others, informed me that capital is looking this way more than ever. The prevailing opinion is that Oregon presents more undeveloped resources than any state or territory in the Union. I am proud to be the servant of such a state, and I find that my acquaintance in Washington is of more benefit to Oregon than anything I can do right here on the scene. I have been harshly criticized in many quarters for this, for not spending more time here. I may be eliminated for pursuing such a course, but I shall be a candidate for the United States Senate again, if I live."

The announcement was received in absolute silence, and the session returned to the consideration of a 30-foot channel to the sea.

O. A. C. WILL HAVE

A CHESS CLUB

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Oct. 14.—O. A. C. will have a chess club. This was the decision reached last night at a meeting of some 30 enthusiasts who had responded to a call from Professor Tallander for a meeting of those interested in the formation of such a club. Professor Tallander was made chairman of the temporary organization, and plans were drawn up providing for a permanent organization soon to be perfected.

An attempt will be made to encourage the organization of similar clubs at other Northwest colleges. If this is successful, chess will be added to the list of intercollegiate contests.

WOLFF FIRED OFF

O. A. C. FOOTBALL TEAM

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Oct. 14.—Carl Wolff, captain of the 1908 team, and All-Northwest half back last year, was today summarily discharged from the football squad by Coach Metzger for insubordination. Wolff has always been a bad man to handle, and consequently has been given his own way in previous years. This season Wolff attempted his usual tactics, to which Metzger objected.

Metzger told the ex-captain what he expected of his men, and that he must respect his orders. Wolff is said to have made a pretense of obedience, but really to have provoked Metzger frequently. Metzger warned him several times and the crisis came when Wolff failed to appear at practice last night, and neglected to explain his absence.

ANOTHER MAIN STREET PROPERTY CHANGE

This firm is reporting the sale of from four or five to 20 and 25 residences a day.

NEW THEATRE OPENS THIS EVENING

J. J. Bryan's new moving picture house opens for the first time this evening. "It will be a pleasant surprise to all who see it. The interior is finished in red and green, with pretty green lights along the walls. On the outside a cement arch is prettily lighted by a dozen large ground glass globes and the mirrors and effect box office give a very pretty effect. The wiring for the theatre, which was done by Thomas, a Eugene electrician, was completed this afternoon. The painters still have quite a bit of work left yet. The seats were placed this afternoon.

LARGE SHIPMENT OF LOGGING CABLE

The Booth-Kelly Company has received two large drums of one-inch wire cable to be used at the Forrest logging camp, on the McKenzie. There is nearly a mile (4000 feet) of the iron rope, and each drum weighs several tons. They must be hauled by horses to the camp, which will be a big job. The rope will be used in connection with the donkey engines. The Booth-Kelly Company is now fitting up a large camp here and will employ many men all winter.
