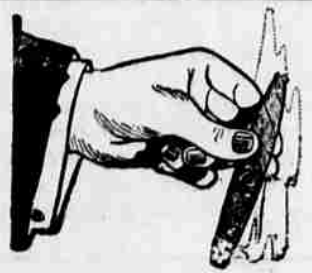

EARL F. STRONG WRITES FROM HARVARD

Former Guard Employee at
University Student Tells
of Old College

Earl F. Strong, who graduated from the University last June, and who was employed as reporter for The Guard for two or three years, writes to a friend from Harvard College as follows:

"Harvard appears to be all that tradition has made it be to the mind of this Western lad. Yet many things here are strange—strange beyond recounting. When the football team goes on the field the students and spectators clap, but do not yell. I have not heard a college yell in Cambridge yet. The grounds are beautiful and so are the buildings, but not from an architect's or artist's point of view. The traditional is the key to Harvard's buildings, so far as I can see. For instance, many of the buildings are veritable bars of the class rooms are veritable bars built two hundred years ago. The desks are mere planks, penciled and carved by a hundred classes. Some of the buildings are so bare and ugly that I would hesitate to put my horse there. Yet these worn benches and desks are as carefully preserved as the gold of a bank vault. Such is also the condition of the dormitories. The rooms occupied by Emerson, or Lowell, or Rufus Choate are said to be uncomfortable and inconvenient. Yet the rent on these rooms is high, merely because of the associations.

"This appears to be the spirit of Harvard, and it is not such a bad thing, for while a proper price is put on most things, one cannot but remember that there are things of more consequence than gold or silver or precious stones.

"If you take law for your profession, or medicine, come to Harvard. The graduate departments are as good as the country has. But Oregon undergraduate life seems as profitable as that of Harvard. Judging from the samples I have seen."

LEBANON-CRABTREE EXTENSION RUSHED

Lebanon, Or., Oct. 19.—Work on the Lebanon-Crabtree extension of the Southern Pacific railroad is progressing rapidly. About two miles of grading has been completed and more men and teams are being added daily.

At the Hayden Bros' camp, on the Claypool farm, about 160 horses and mules and 60 men are at work; at the Dollard farm there are about 100 horses and mules and 40 men.

Fifty horses, with two engines and a number of teams, are preparing to construct the huge steel structure, which will be when completed one of the largest and longest bridges in this part of Oregon.

Two camps were established Sunday, one just inside the city limits, which will begin grading from the river to the present terminus of the road, and the other on the Chamberlain farm, just across the river, where a big cut will be made. The excavation for the piers is progressing, and work is expected to begin on the centre pier next Monday.

FAMOUS HYPNOTIST

WILL APPEAR HERE

Professor L. S. Ellermann

LECTURE-SERMON BY REV. PEEBLES

Rev. Stephen Peebles, at the Unitarian services Sunday evening in Frank's hall, announced his discourse as a lecture-sermon; about four-fifths lecture and one-fifth sermon. He discussed the book of Job. To the speaker for many years it has been the best of all literature. Some years ago Richard Grant White had pronounced the book of Job, with King Lear, the two great dramatic poems of the world. It is a dramatic poem with a prose introduction and a prose conclusion. There are defects apparent to the most casual reader. We pass over these with slight mention.

The text is found in the 13th chapter, 15th verse, "Lo, he saitheth me, and I have no hope: yet will I justify my works before him."

The speaker gave a clear analysis of the whole book and turned his attention to the lessons taught. Job was called the patient man, but he was far from that. In fact, his impatience was shown in every utterance. Here for the first time was found a spirit bold enough to go contrary to the established doctrine which had possessed the Jewish people and still pervades extensively throughout the world, that disaster and failure are the results of wrongdoing, while success and blessings show right conduct.

There is in man that which impels him to do right because it is right, and enables him to speak as did Job in the language of the text.

Another object of the discourse was to emphasize the need of an organization for the study of the Bible. He hoped that such an organization might be effected.
