"The main line out of Salem will run to the east side of the Southern Pacific on entering Albany. The main line work will be done in a hurry, and by next summer cars will be operating between this city and Eugene on a good schedule. Our rolling stock will be the best obtainable, and we plan on giving a service that can't be beat.

\$1,000,000 Power Plant

"Our power propositions are being developed rapidly. The power plant at Martins Rapids, on the McKenzie river, will be constructed at a cost of \$1,000,000. Today we ordered 17 cars of cement. We have purchased poles for a line from Eugene to Blue River on the McKenzie. Martins Rapids lies about midway between Blue River and Eugene.

"You can say that the Northwest Corporation means business all over the Willamette valley and that when our traction lines are fully in operation there will be no interurban service in the country that can eclipse the valley lines of this concern."

HORACE MCKINLEY WRITES LETTER TO PAPER

Horace McKinley, the land fraud dude, who is in the Portland county jail, writes the following characteristic letter to the Portland Daily News anent the recent criticism of the sheriff for allowing him liberties:

I would like to have you publish the fact that should I have desired to pay the fine of \$7,500 imposed upon me by the Judge Wolverton at the time of sentence, I would have been a free man this morning, as the two years have expired. I concluded, however, not to pay the amount but instead will serve the extra 30 days required by law. In lieu thereof and will endeavor to do in a manner that, I hope, will satisfy and please the reporters on the Oregonian, Telegram and Journal, who seem to take such an interest in my case, as also the new county grand jury, should they see fit to investigate the matter, as the last one did.

From 8 to 9 o'clock a. m., while taking my "daily promenade" up and down the corridors of the jail I will wear the "Oregon boot," and while on a "pleasure stroll" in the afternoon (4 to 5 o'clock, same place) I will buckle on the ball and chain. The balance of the day I will eat and be confined in one of the steel cages in the main corridor, and in full view of the reporters as they pass in and out. I will request the jailers to lock me in the dungeon during the night, without blankets. Will eat (in the cage) one meal every other day, and tap myself when I want a drink, as I am "anemically inclined," according to the Oregonian. The steam baths will be cut out entirely—the rousters handed to me by the papers mentioned will do the work well.

I will send Mrs. McKinley to the mountains—perhaps "11-7."

Will relinquish the title "Land Fraud King." It never was mine anyway, but rightfully belonged to Pater.

I never attained a higher rank than first lieutenant, or I might say, at times, the King's Knave.

I would like to have it known that I will undergo any hardship or punishment, during the next 30 days, in order to please a few of my pencil-pushing friends, provided they will consider me "dead and buried" at the end of that time.

BOOTH-KELLY CO. SUES CITY FOR INJUNCTION

Attempts to Restrain City from Diverting Water of McKenzie to Canal

Late yesterday afternoon the Booth-Kelly Company, through its attorneys, Woodcock & rotter, filed an injunction suit against the city to permanently restrain it from diverting the waters of the McKenzie river into its power canal, which is in course of construction, claiming that the diversion of the water into the canal would lower the water in the river for a distance of seven miles so that logging operations would be greatly interfered with. The defendants named in the complaint are the city of Eugene, J. D. Matlock, mayor, T. H. Garrett, J. E. Roach, W. S. Moon, R. B. Henderson, J. M. Williams, F. J. Berger, A. W. Gilbert and Sherman Heller, comprising the city council.

Portions of the complaint are as follows:

And said canal is so being constructed and will be so constructed as to divert the water from the McKenzie river and into from the McKenzie river and into said canal, so that the said water will be diverted and detained from said McKenzie river and not returned thereto for a distance of upward of seven miles below the intake of the canal.

And the said waters will be continuously and permanently diverted from the river by the operation of said electric plant from thereto for a distance of upward of seven miles from what is known as Bradley's island in said river, will be deprived of a great portion of the flow of the waters of the river continuously and permanently.

That said timber adjacent to said McKenzie water shed is one of the largest and most valuable bodies of merchantable timber in the state of Oregon or elsewhere, and that said river is the only means of transportation of said timber to market. That the river has been used for more than 30 years as a public highway for the transportation of such sawlogs and timber obtained from said water shed to the end that such logs and timber were transported to the various mills and markets between the points where the same were put into said river as far as the city of Portland and elsewhere.

And said river has been so used continuously for upward of 30 years as such public highway for purposes aforesaid, from the mouth of the river for the whole length thereof, and many miles above the intake of said canal.

That the diversion and detention of the waters of the McKenzie river as proposed and intended by said defendants will so reduce in volume the waters of said river that the use of said McKenzie river as a public highway and as a navigable stream for the purpose of floating and transporting logs and timber as aforesaid will be greatly injured and destroyed; and that the plaintiff will be deprived of the use of the same for transporting logs and timber as hereinbefore set forth, and the business of the plaintiff and the value of its timber lands and sawmill and other property used in connection therewith will be greatly injured and depreciated in value, and that the principal means of getting logs and timber to said sawmill will be greatly injured or destroyed, to the irreparable injury and damage of said plaintiff.

TIN SOLDIERS ARE OF THE PAST

Militia Hereafter Must Be Real Fighting Organization

Washington, Oct. 22.—January 21 next will be a critical date in the history of the National Guard. It was announced today, for thereafter no portion of the money appropriated by Congress for the purpose of the militia can be paid to any organization that fails to conform to the standards of the regular army.

Next year, for the first time in its history, the militia, or so much of it as remains under the caption "The National Guard," will be found a changed body, with the latest pattern of military rifles; clothes from head to foot in regular army gear; supplied with the regular equipment, and with ranks filled to the requirements of the law.

In Nevada, it is said, there is not a single company of the National Guard able to establish a claim to a dollar of the war appropriation made by Congress.
