Held Soon to Matter and Council

The city has built up wonderfully during the past two years and now that there are water mains and a dozen fire hydrants east of the University the city will probably place a hose cart there for fire protection. A meeting of Fairmount citizens will be held in a few days to discuss the matter and formulate a petition to the council. At present the nearest hose cart to Fairmount is the one at the East Eleventh street station. As

this has to be drawn by men, it would take fifteen or twenty minutes to get to Fairmount in case of a fire and about as long for the team with the chemical engine to go from the central station down town. Fairmount has never had a fire, but this is no indication that it is immune. In case of fire at present there would be absolutely no means of fighting it except with garden hose.

CONCERT BAND IS ORGANIZED IN EUGENE

First Rehearsal Will Be Held Tonight and Will Be Attended by Twenty Members

A concert band is being organized in Eugene and the first rehearsal will be held tonight in Villard Hall at the University. F. R. Schraeder, a competent band and orchestra director from Longmont, Colo., has recently arrived here and has interested a number of the younger musicians in the matter. He has gathered together twenty of them, but expects to increase the number to thirty and organize a band that will be hard to beat. None of the members of the old military band, which Professor Read made such a success of, will be included in the personnel of the new organization. Mr. Schraeder would like to have some of the older musicians as a nucleus around which to build his new organization, but most of the members of the former organization are discouraged at the failure of their attempts to give the city a good band and decline to take part in the new effort. Mr. Schraeder says he will have a concert band equal to the best in the state and one that the city will be proud of. He is especially desirous of encouraging a reed section and wants ten or twelve young men to take up the work on the clarinet from the beginning.

PORTOLA PARADE GREATEST EVER SEEN IN FRISCO

Many Special Features and Twenty Thousand Marchers

San Francisco, Oct. 21.—The beautiful weather of today brought out immense crowds to witness the great parade of the Portola festival. It was a parade headed by Don Gaspar de Portola and Queen Verilia, and was the greatest affair of the kind ever witnessed in the city. All California was represented by personal delegations from the various towns or by official floats and twenty thousand people in line. The most spectacular feature was two thousand Chinese carrying the largest fire breathing dragon ever imported, while the whole Oriental section was a gorgeous riot of color. The Spanish war veterans, headed by General James F. Smith, former governor general of the Philippines, and commander of the first California volunteers in the Spanish-American war, carried the huge American flag made for the Hudson-Fulton celebrations.

CARRIAGE MAKERS MUST BUILD AUTOS

Washington, Oct. 20.—Automobiles have displaced carriages to such an extent that the carriage-builders are obliged to retire from business or devote their attention to the construction of automobile bodies.

In effect this was the statement made today by Maurice Connolly of Dubuque, Ia., president of the Carriage Builders' National Association of the United States, which convened here in its 35th annual meeting.
