CAMPAIGN IN GREATER NEW YORK Candidates Are Active and Indulge in Personalities

other night of whirlwind speechmaking in the municipal campaign, but the three candidates brought out nothing new in the way of personal attacks. W. R. Hearst, the independent nominee, delivered four speeches in New York; Otto T. Bannard, the Republican nominee, spoke three times in Brooklyn, then appeared at Carnegie Hall, N. Y. before a big fusion gathering, and William J. Gaynor, the Democratic nominee, appeared in Brooklyn.

Hearst opened with an attack on Gaynor and Tammany, reviewing his efforts in behalf of the people through his newspapers.

Gaynor smilingly referred to his first visit to Tammany Hall last night. "I have beard the tiger in his den," he said, "and have faced that dreaded animal without a quail and I am now convinced nothing on earth can make me afraid."

Gaynor referred to Hearst as a belching demagogue who has never yet read the city charter.

Ex-Mayor Seth Low, a Republican was one of the principal speakers at the Carnegie Hall meeting. His mention of Hearst brought cheering.

"I am glad you applauded Mr. Hearst," said Mr. Low, "because he is fighting with us in this campaign against Tammany."

RAILROAD CAMPS MIGHT CAUSE TYPHOID

Germs May Be Carried Down River, Thence Into Water System

Unless Eugene is very careful there is danger of another typhoid epidemic this winter. One or two cases of the fever have broken out in the railroad camps up the river and germs will be carried from them down the river into Eugene's water supply. These germs are carried in water a long distance and are not removed by filtering. This is the opinion of a local physician, who says if any more cases break out in the camps the situation will be extremely grave.

At present the water supply in Eugene is good. Although there are a few cases of typhoid fever in Eugene their source is not due to city water. There is one in Fairmount where the family has no city water and a poor well. A second on College Hill which is the result of drinking some poor well water while out of town. A third is Clay Watson who is seriously sick at the hospital. It is not known from what source he contracted the fever.

Everyone should be careful of their water this winter especially if any more cases develop up the river.

STRONG FOR STATE

Tom Richardson, who has been in the Willamette and Umpqua valleys on a trip for the Oregon Development league, returned to Portland yesterday. He held meetings at Creswell, Springfield, Eugene, Brownsville and Albany, and all were successful in showing the increasing enthusiasm of Oregon people for publicity work. At Springfield a \$1500 advertising fund is to be raised. At Eugene more than a third of the \$15,000 fund was raised at the first meeting, and at both the Creswell and Springfield meetings large delegations from Eugene were present. Wallace R. Struble, manager of the Albany Commercial Club, attended the Brownsville meeting last night and spoke on behalf of Albany's apple show. Journal.

DIVINE HEALER IS IDENTIFIED Papers Prove That He Was Not the Genuine Francis Schlatter

Hastings, Neb., Oct. 21.—The mystery surrounding the death of the man claiming to be Francis Schlatter, was partially cleared tonight by the discovery of a family album containing a picture of the dead man. This was inscribed Dr. Charles McLean. A note was also found naming David McNaughton, of Chicago, as custodian of his effects. His literature and advertising circulars declare him to be "Francis Schlatter, divine healer." A receipt for an envelope deposited with the Bay State Trust Company, of Boston, was also found. This was placed in the care of the company last February.

For three weeks the man has been kept at the expense of the city. He said he was the original healer who appeared in Denver and he averred that he caused the report to be spread abroad that he had perished in the desert. He undertook to cure by divine healing in several Nebraska towns last summer. Pictures, newspaper cuts and magazine illustrations seem to indicate that he is the same man who caused the uproar in Denver several years ago.

The man was found dead in a room at the Hastings Hotel, where he had been for about a month. Doctors say he died of old age.
