## RUSSELL PORTER THINKS COOK LIES

Topographer of His Expedition  
Takes No Stock in  
Story

Portland, Me., Oct. 30.—A signed statement given to the Associated Press by Russell Porter, topographer on the Mount McKinley expedition of Cook, declares that if it is true that one of the photographs in Dr. Cook's book was taken on the evening of the day the doctor reached what was known as Camp No. 6, the photograph cannot be one of the summit of Mount McKinley. Porter tells of going to Alaska in 1904 as a surveyor. When Cook and Barrill made the trip on which Cook says he reached the top of Mt. McKinley, Porter remained behind to do some mapping. The doctor and Barrill reappeared with the account of the ascent of Mt. McKinley.

"At that time," Porter's statement continues, "I had no reason to doubt the statements that have since been described in Cook's book, 'To the Top of the Continent.'"

"In the published affidavit of Barrill he states that the photograph opposite page 102 of Cook's book was taken on the evening of the same day that he took him with the flag at what he claims was the top of Mount McKinley, and was taken at Camp No. 6. This camp was only three or four miles from one of my surveying stations, a locality which I recognized distinctly."

"It is about five thousand feet contour and is some twenty miles from the summit, according to my topographical maps, purchased by the government."

"If it is true that the photograph signed 'The Top of the Continent' was taken the evening of the day they made this camp, this photograph cannot be the summit of Mount McKinley."

Cottage Grove, Nov. 1.—The Baptists of Cottage Grove will erect an edifice of worship on Locust street, east of the railroad tracks. It is expected to have it completed this fall. The building will cost \$2000. The Baptist church has a membership of sixteen, only five of the number being males. The aid of the mission is necessary in getting the building.

## MRS. JENNINGS

### DIED TODAY

North Bend Woman Succumbs  
to Gasoline Poisoning at  
Her Home

This afternoon it had not been definitely determined when the funeral will be held, owing to some of the relatives not being heard from. However, it will probably be held on Friday afternoon from the Wilson undertaking parlors.
