TO MEET U. OF O.

Debate Between Girl Teams
Will Take Place on Lat-
ter's Challenge

The University of Oregon for the first time, will have a girl's debating team. This was decided last night after a somewhat lively meeting of the student affairs committee, composed of four students and five faculty. Last year the women of the University of Washington issued a challenge to the co-eds of Oregon to meet them in debate. The question was brought up and discussed, but the prevailing attitude of the faculty at that time was that debating on the public rostrum hardly benefitted the college woman. The students in general favored the ladies' debating team, and leaving out the question of financing the project, was heartily in favor of taking up the challenge by Washington.

Since then the debate coaches, together with a number of students interested, have kept matters before the student body, and brought such pressure to bear that the question was considered by the "affairs committee" and permission granted to the women to meet the co-eds of Seattle. The question of financing and details were not considered, and will be worked out by the student committee on oratory and debate. The student affairs committee also recommends that an advisory committee be formed among the women of the university to discuss all questions pertaining to the women. The affairs committee suggests one girl from each sorority and an equal number from the girls living without the sorority houses.

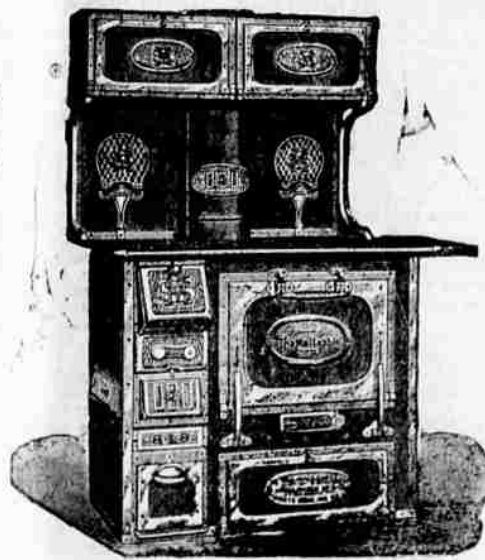
