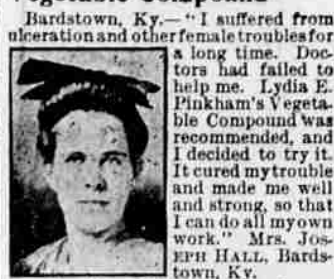

ALL PYTHIAN LODGES TO BE INSPECTED

New Grand Lodge System Provides for One Official Visit Yearly

Every lodge of Knights of Pythias in Oregon will be visited by the chief officers of the order in the state, no matter how small the lodge or how remote its location, before the next grand lodge session in June, 1910. At the session of the grand lodge at Pendleton last June a plan was perfected whereby the grand chancellor will visit half of the lodges and the grand vice-chancellor the other half each year. So many new lodges have been instituted that it has become almost impossible for one man to visit all during his term. In many cases, however, both of the two leading officers will visit the lodges together and a number of other grand officers will accompany them frequently. Each lodge is preparing for a big time when the official visit is received.

The tours have already begun. The first trip was made late in the summer by Grand Chancellor Frank Menefee, of The Dalles, to the lodges at Seaside, Neskalem and Tillamook. He was accompanied on his overland trip down the coast by L. R. Stinson of Salem, grand keeper of records and seal, and Attorney Frank S. Grant of Portland, one of the most active men in the grand lodge. While this trip was in progress Grand Vice-Chancellor D. E. Yoran of Eugene, made a trip to the Coos Bay country and visited the lodges at Marshfield, North Bend, Bandon, Coquille and Myrtle Point.

Grand Chancellor Menefee then made a trip into Central Oregon, accompanied by Judge R. R. Butler of Condon. On this trip he visited the lodges at Condon, Prineville, Bend, Mitchell, Lone Rock, Canyon City, and Long Creek. Both Grand Chancellor Menefee and Grand Vice-Chancellor Yoran will leave on other trips soon. The latter will visit the lodges at Grant Pass, Medford, Ashland and Klamath Falls, accompanied by Grand Keeper of Records and Seal Stinson, and the grand chancellor will go to Roseburg and then come northward, visiting all of the numerous lodges in the Willamette valley.

District conventions will be held in every district in the state this winter. The first will be at Salem, November 9. The lodges at Salem, Silverton, Dallas, Independence, Falls City, Hubbard and Astoria, will all send delegations and the following

grand officers are expected: William M. Cake of Portland, supreme representative; W. L. Bradshaw of The Dalles, supreme representative; Frank Menefee of The Dalles, grand chancellor; D. E. Yoran of Eugene, grand vice-chancellor; George Schuimert of Hillsboro, grand prelate; L. R. Stinson of Salem, grand keeper of records and seal; and George W. Knight, of Hubbard, grand inner guard.

Knights of Khorassan.
Beside the regular Pythian gatherings this winter, the dramatic order of the Knights of Khorassan, the hilarious branch of Pythianism, will hold several big meetings. The temple of this order is located in Portland, but its membership includes prominent Knights in all parts of the state. At Pendleton last June a class of 161 tyros from various parts of Oregon was initiated into this order in lively convalescence. The "Dokies" will hold some big meetings in Portland this winter and are also planning some pilgrimages into some of the larger cities of the state.

HARRIMAN MAP OF DESCHUTES ROAD APPROVED

Washington, Nov. 5.—The interior department today approved the Deschutes railroad map of section two of its road. For three quarters of a mile this right of way conflicts with the right of way of the Oregon Trunk line, where the right of way passes through a narrow defile. Aside from this short distance there is no conflict between the two rights of way.

BUTTERFLY BURNS TO WATER'S EDGE

River Steamer Totally Destroyed Following Explosion in Boiler Room

(From Portland Telegram.)
Catching fire at 11:45 o'clock yesterday morning near the head of Martin Island, while bound from Portland for Rainier, the river steamer Butterfly burned to the water's edge in less than half an hour. The craft had just tied up to the shore a moment before she had become wrapped in flames. Captain A. L. Braze, her master, declares he believes the fire started from an oil explosion. The steamer was recently converted into an oil burner.

The captain was the only one on board when the fire broke out, the other members of the crew being ashore getting wood for the purpose of trying to get up more steam on her. During the entire trip down the river the oil plant did not work properly. Captain Cash Wier, who had gone out on her for this one trip as engineer, says that it was impossible to keep up steam with the oil fuel. It was at his suggestion that a stop was finally made to take on a quantity of firewood. Wier and several other men had just stepped ashore for this purpose when Captain Braze says the flames shot up from amidships, and in a few seconds the craft was a solid mass of flames. He succeeded in reaching shore before his last avenue of escape was cut off. As near as he could make out, the skipper says the fire started in the boiler room, near the furnace, which leads him to believe there was an explosion.

The Butterfly was owned by Harry Young of this city, who recently placed her in regular service between Portland and Rainier in the freight trade. The loss was partly covered with an insurance of \$7500. What remains of the ill was hauled as far ashore as possible, and a watchman was left in charge. The Butterfly was formerly the Jessie Harkins, which was operated for a time by the Washougal Transportation Company. She was purchased by Mr. Young several months ago and remodeled. It is probable that the steamer will be rebuilt.
