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UPHOLDING THE LAW

Joseph Shipp and five others, of Chattanooga, Tenn., to prison for contempt of the United States supreme rehearing having been denied. and is firmly resolved to discover the South Pole. Sir says there is only one pole left and it must be English. So strong is this feeling that a fund is rapidly accumulating to defray the expenses of another Scott-Shackleton expedition to the antarctic. It is settled that Captain Scott will start August, much earlier than he expected. The sum of \$100,000 will be forthcoming for the enterprise—everything they can furnish for the success of the undertaking will be done. The biggest item will be that of wages and salaries. Scott says it will be easy to equip the expedition in a day and men ready to go without any salary at all, but that making geologists who knew no geology, and a cook who could cook. So every one is to be fairly paid, and \$40,000 is allocated to cover all expenses for one year's work.

The final dash the party will consist of six men. They will make a series of relays, carefully arranging the question of transport in view of a prolonged sojourn from the base. Modes of transport are available, ponies, dogs and motor and it is on the last named that Captain Scott seems to place chief reliance. He has been experimenting on sledges in Norway with a motor shod with hard-wood runners, which are fixed in sections on endless bands in the same way as in the case of the caterpillar traction engines, which have proved well adapted for negotiating rough ground, and he has confidence that this novel plan of locomotion over glaciers will prove an important factor in solving the problem of the South Pole, which is the real problem of the South Pole.

It is proposed to establish an additional new base in King Edward's land, some 400 miles east of that in McMurdo Sound used by Mr. Shackleton, in common with other antarctic explorers. Though one of the objects of the expedition is to make the magnetic data obtained by the ship Discovery, it will be to break new ground, and particularly to explore the Seventh's land.

There is much regret over the announced retirement of Mr. Hartog from Eugene's publicity work at the close of his present term. GRESHAM'S LAW IN THE SPIRITUAL WORLD

The above was the topic of Rev. Peebles' sermon at the Unitarian service Sunday evening. Probably all in the audience expected the enunciation of some formidable dogma and were surprised at the simple statement "Bad money drives out good."

Thomas Gresham was master of the mint in the time of Elizabeth. Little else is known of him. His experience led him to declare that inferior currency displaced a superior. No discussion of political economy would be attempted. Does the law hold in the financial world and in the spiritual world, for in the latter there is that which corresponds to currency. Conditions attending the introduction of paper money in the time of our civil war were reviewed. Some contended that the trouble arose from making paper currency legal tender at all. Others that the legal tender act was limited.

The period from 500 B. C. to 450 B. C. was the time of the highest civilization of the nations spiritually. Good authorities gave the year 444 B. C. as the time when the Jewish system known as the Mosaic law was perfected.

This prescribed rites and ceremonies for all the details of life, the giving of one-tenth of the products even of the most common garden herbs, mint, dill and cummin. It was against this custom that Christ had cried out in the words of the text, Matthew 23:23: "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, actors," etc. It was this custom that was meant in the declaration, "Destroy this temple and I will build it a new one." In other words, take away the legal tender value from the inferior currency and immediately the superior will resume its function.

The statement was paralleled by the great American Horace Greeley, when he constantly thundered, "The way to resume is to resume." He proceeded to show how in the former times and perhaps in the present inferior spiritual currency circulated to the exclusion of the superior. The legal tender value given to rites and ceremonies debased the currency. Consideration of right, justice and equity had been displaced by the paying of tithes. In some cases it was the undue value placed on the ceremony of baptism, the amount of water necessary, the way the water should be applied, the forms of worship, the wording of creeds. The speaker had been reared a Quaker and still loved them, but he could see how their attention to form of speech and articles of dress was merely the giving of legal tender value to an inferior spiritual currency. But a faint idea of the merit of the address can be given in a synopsis.
