ASTORIA HIGH

FORFEITS GAME

TO EUGENE HIGH

Could Not Stand Expense of
Bringing Team to This
City

The Astoria High school has forfeited its football game with the Eugene High on account of its inability to stand the expense of bringing its team here. This leaves only Salem to defeat to win the league pennant, and from stories from Salem it seems as though the chances for this are remarkably good. In order to get a better hold on the state championship, Eugene is negotiating with Washington High (Portland), for a contest next Saturday in place of the Astoria game. If they win this game and the one with Salem they have the state honor.

But the question is, will they win these? Salem has a poorer team this year, and although they can give Eugene a hard fight the odds are against them. But the game with Portland will not be so easy. They stand the best over Eugene High by more points than Eugene won by. Still, it can be said for the local team that they did not play their best in that game. This is what makes the matter uncertain. This matter of "going up in the air" is a decided discredit to a team. It has been characteristic of the High school several times, most notably in the Salem game last year. It is very discouraging to a team's supporters to know that their team can do it but will not.

However, if they can play their best they have a team that can easily defeat Washington High. Their line this year cannot be broken; it is heavier than ever before and very strong. Jenkins at half is playing a semi-collegiate game, and it is probable that he is unequalled by any academic half. Nolan, the other half, can balance his side of the back line. Dustin has the football head for his position at quarter and can be depended upon. Eugene can win if they stay on the ground.

OREGON WEAK AT

OFFENSIVE GAME

Jack Latourette, captain of the Multnomah Club football team, a former University of Oregon captain and several times a selection for All-Northwest quarterback in his college days, thinks the State University team is lacking in several respects, and that considerable work will be necessary before the team can expect to defeat the University of Idaho next Saturday in anything like an impressive manner.

Relative to their showing against the Multnomah Club last Saturday, in which they won by a field goal, Latourette says:

"The team work was considerable

of a disappointment to those who saw the game. The system of developing too many men has necessarily handicapped the organization of the team work. If Oregon is to win against Idaho they must devote considerable time to their offensive work this week. Coach Forbes realizes this very well and this week will find the team going through the hardest kind of offensive play.

"The defense, while good in many respects, was lacking in coherence. Multnomah made considerable yardage between tackle and end which seemed due to the fact that the tackles and ends failed to properly break the interference. The backs, however, filled up the holes so that it was difficult for the clubmen to make more than a few yards at a time. Each man tried to tackle the man with the ball instead of breaking the interference, as must be done before the varsity can expect to stop the fast line backs of the better trained college teams."

STATE "OUTLAW" LEAGUE

UNDER THE WINGS

Memphis, Nov. 9.—The practical admission of the California state league, an "outlaw circuit," to the national association of baseball leagues and minor league leagues was the result of the first day's session of the national board of arbitration here yesterday. The board spent the day discussing the terms under which California would be admitted and an agreement will be presented to the entire association for final action.

CHEVROLET WINS

IN GREAT RACE

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 9.—Louis Chevrolet, the Swiss pilot of the Buick car, who has jumped into racing prominence within the last year, annexed another hard-earned victory here today when he captured the 200-mile stock chassis race, averaging about 72 miles an hour.

Chevrolet's victory came as a climax in a record-breaking contest in which Atlanta's new two-mile speedway was opened.

Two of Barney Oldfield's records were lowered, one of them by Louis Strang, who reduced Oldfield's one-mile mark of 23:01 by more than five seconds. He did it Strang used the big 200-horsepower Fiat, which made a record of 23 seconds over the 3 1/4-mile track at Brooklands, England, last summer. Oldfield took the limit out of hitherto unbeaten Benz, and took nearly three seconds off his own previous record.

Strang Has Fastest Car
"Strang has the fastest car in the world at present," Oldfield said after the race.

Two cars of greater power than Strang's are said to be in course of construction abroad, one in Italy, the other in Germany.

HIGH SCHOOL DEBATING

SYSTEM REARRANGED

Will Work Triangular Scheme
This Year—Local Debaters Working

The High school debating system is being re-arranged this year on the triangular scheme, and the districts have been differently divided. In the triangular system there are two teams from each school, who debate on opposite sides of the same question at the same time. This makes the championship depend upon the number of points and lessens the chance to secure partiality of judges. This is the plan that the larger inter-collegiate leagues use. For the local district the schools have been grouped as follows: Salem, Albany and Eugene; Junction, Springfield and Cottage Grove; Jefferson, Independence and Lebanon.

The Eugene High school debaters have been working with unusual energy and over twenty will try out some time next week for positions on the two teams. This is a larger number than have ever taken part before.

Not many of last year's debaters have been lost by graduation and there are remarkably good chances for a successful team this year.

ROOSEVELT SEEKING

AMERICAN ZONE IN

AFRICA, SAY FRENCH

Paris, Nov. 9.—Although the French newspapers are devoting much space to Colonel Roosevelt, they are paying very little attention to the facts since he has been Africa. The Petit Parisien today has a new "dream" in an article under a Rome date from a staff correspondent, who says the real motive of Roosevelt's trip to Africa is territorial aggression, and insists that the hunt is a "mere pretext for covering a political commission."

The correspondent says this commission involves the exploration of certain parts of Africa in preparation for American occupancy and settlement.

How the territory is to be grabbed or who is backing the scheme the correspondent fails to state.

FEARFUL STORM

RAGES AT NOME

Nome, Alaska, Nov. 9.—The worst storm for many years is raging here today, and many wharves and other structures on the water front have been torn down by the violent wind. Several small steamers have been wrecked, including the York, which was blown ashore and destroyed at Unalakleet. The Mary Sachs is aground in the Snake river, and the Wilkes in the Tyshow river. There have been no reports of loss of life thus far.
