ROUNDHOUSE AND SHOPS TALK AGAIN

The superintendent of buildings and bridges of the Southern Pacific Company, N. Rose, was in Springfield yesterday. The purpose of his business may have been, as he said, to see about the remodeling of the depot, a little work that is being done that will take one carpenter perhaps two days, or he may also have other reasons than this, for his department has charge of all new buildings.

When asked to the point whether he had any definite knowledge about the rumored proposal to erect car shops and barns on the company's holdings here, he only replied that the railroad men were not supposed to know one day what the company was going to do the next. He did, however, admit that there were very good reasons for playing shops or roundhouses here, and that the amount of land being held by the Southern Pacific here was more than could possibly be used for truckage and that the railroad company didn't often hold land as an investment, and that if any such work was done it must be started soon.

While it is a fact that few railroad men, whether superintendent of a department or not, know what their company has planned for them, they often get a pretty good idea from pointers which the outsiders do not have. It is also very unwise for one of them to positively tell anything which he may have surmised with certainty, or even when he knows, unless it is understood that there is no objection.

Railroad men in the head office at Portland say that Springfield is about as often mentioned as any place in the state, and it is very frequent that one of the "big moguls" is here, although they do not publicly announce the fact beforehand. This is the second time Mr. Rose has been here recently, and it is quite improbable he should spend so much time merely to oversee the rearrangement of a small depot office.

CHANGE IN LOCAL PLUMBING FIRM

HARRISBURG MAN WINS IN FAMOUS HOP LITIGATION

Harrisburg, Or., Nov. 9.—Word has been received by J. R. Cartwright, a leading local hopgrower, that he had won his famous hop case in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals. The case was in the Federal Courts of Oregon and California for six years and attracted a great deal of attraction among Oregon hopmen. The news of Cartwright's victory came from San Francisco, in a message to Attorney J. K. Weatherford, of Albany, who represented him in the litigation.

In 1902 Cartwright entered into a contract with Lillenthal Bros., of New York, to sell them 40,000 pounds of hops annually for five years from his hopyard in Lane county, a short distance south of this city. It was orally agreed, according to Cartwright's allegations, that, in the event he sold his yard, the contract should be void.

Cartwright delivered the 1902 crop in accordance with the terms of the contract, at 10 cents a pound. In the spring of 1903 he sold 10 acres off his yard and that Fall a representative of Lillenthal Bros. entered into a new contract releasing the 10 acres sold from the terms of the agreement.

Before he picked his 1903 crop Cartwright sold his hopyard. Up to that time the price of hops had been low, but that winter they soared to 31 cents a pound. The company sued Cartwright for the difference between the contract price and the actual market price on the 1903 crop of 30,000 pounds, while Cartwright, relying on the sale agreement, had failed to deliver.

They also sued again the next year on the 1904 crop and both actions were ultimately joined and tried on the same issues. A decision was handed down yesterday, in which the higher court affirmed Judge Wolverson in his refusal to grant a rehearing of the case.
