TO PLAY EUGENE HIGH

Manager Nesmith, of the Eugene High school football team, says he has used every endeavor to induce the Columbia University and Washington High school teams of Portland to come to Eugene for a game with the local team, but both absolutely refuse to come, saying it is impossible to do so, but the manager and local players think it is a case of cold feet. They aver that the Portland aggregations are afraid of Eugene in view of the severe drubbing given Portland Academy by the locals recently. Manager Nesmith has offered to pay the expenses of either team to come to Eugene on Saturday of this week, but still they refuse.

Unless a post-season game can be arranged with one of these teams, and it is highly improbable that this can be done, Eugene will claim the state championship.

MORE RECORDS

BROKEN AT ATLANTA

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 10.—Two heart-breaking finishes, and the lowering of the track records by Strang, and rain which prevented two events, were the features of the second day's meet at the speedway here. After many disappointments yesterday, Harding drove an Apperson "Jack-rabbit" to victory in a ten-mile contest. The Buick car won the amateur 10-mile free-for-all by 1-100 of a second, but lost the feature event, 100 miles, on the last lap. The Buick was driven by Joe Nelson, Chevrolet's mechanical man, and he lost on the last lap to Will Knipper when his lubricating oil became exhausted.

Lewis Strang was compelled to withdraw from the 10-mile race for large stock cars after the first lap, in which his Fiat "60" had assumed the lead. He captured two other races in his 10-horsepower Fiat with ease. Beats Oldfield and Christie.

Strang defeated Oldfield and Christie in a specially arranged 10-mile race in the remarkable time of 97:01.94, averaging about 63:39:50 to the mile excepting in the last lap, when he blew a tire and had to reduce speed at the turn. This alone prevented him from negotiating this distance in less than 7 minutes. In the four-mile event Strang averaged 9:41.11. George Robertson was compelled to withdraw his Fiat from both events in which he entered. The feature of the day, the 100-

mile light stock car race, ended in the first and second places going to the Chalmers-Detroit drivers, Knipper and Matson, respectively. At the start Nelson fought Matson for second place, eventually winning it when the latter stopped for repairs.

Hayes, St. Ives, Marsh and Fitzgerald, the four greatest Marathon runners in the world, are in Portland, and will have a race. The men have become professionals, and are going over the country giving races.

"IN DREAMLAND"

ROASTED TO FINISH
BY NEWSPAPER

It would seem that there are more insane and indecent musical comedy productions on the road this year than ever before. The success of "The Girl from Rector's," in spite of the efforts made to suppress it, seems to have influenced managers to put out other productions, even more lewd, which lack also the merit of good acting. Of "In Dreamland," which is billed for the Eugene theatre tonight, the Sacramento Daily Bee of November 8 says:

"In Dreamland," classified by its author, Emmett DeVoy, as a comedy fantasy, turned out at the Clunie last night to be a composite of about all the dramatic materials known. Second-hand selections from every department of the stage and hippodrome played their part in it. Any actor with a specialty was called on to perform it, whether in keeping or out of keeping with the rest of his role. The only character who kept up an appearance of respectability at all in the first part of the show was the faithful wife, and she cut loose and danced the Salome dance along toward the end.

The jokes had all of them had careers, and most of them have been some time in retirement.

The airy sprit from Venus nearly howled over a section of the stage property by flitting through the air too carelessly. This apparition plays a part something like those of Serege's three ghosts in "The Christmas Carol." She shows the hero tabbies exposing the tricks of the blackmailers, and demonstrating his wife's devotion, and cures him of his fault of extreme selfishness. For one act the sprit moralizes not quite in blank verse, but in old English, as if the playwright had heightened his own composition by lifting a choice morsel from "Everyman." The dialogue with the daughter of Venus in the last act is utterly low and contemptible, and would excite indignation against the perpetrators in any respectable barroom. The show will be repeated tonight.
