IDAHO COMES

DETERMINED

A dispatch from Moscow, Idaho, says: Encouraged by their good showing against Washington State College last Friday, and profiting by their early season defeat, the University of Idaho football men are going to Portland determined to defeat Oregon, or at any rate to hold Coach Forbes' proteges down to a scoreless game. The Idaho players are in better shape than they have been at any time this year, and both Coach Grogan and Captain Stokesbury are confident of giving Oregon a battle royal.

The Idaho team averages 172 pounds in weight—a trifle less than the Oregon eleven. Jewell, the veteran center, is showing good form in his favorite position, while Captain Stokesbury and Hayes, exceptionally large men, are doing splendid work as guards. Williams and Dorsett are as good a pair of tackles as Idaho has had for some years. Edmanson and Armstrong, the Idaho ends, are players of experience, and it is certain that Oregon will make little or no yardage through their positions. The work of Idaho's back field the past three or four nights has been most encouraging to the coaches.

Coach Grogan is being assisted by ex-coach Middleton and as a consequence a large amount of "open" playing is being engaged in. The poor showing made by Oregon against Multnomah last Saturday warrants the prediction that Coach Forbes' men will have their hands full when they meet Idaho.

GOVERNORS WILL

ROOT FOR ELEVEN

Governor Brady, of Idaho, and Governor Benson, of Oregon, will watch the annual football game between the Universities of Idaho and Oregon on Multnomah Field tomorrow.

Word was sent from Boise last night that the governor of the Gem state would attend, and the same information came in this morning from Salem that Governor Benson and a number of the state officials would come up for the big event.

The game will start at 2:30 p. m. Saturday and tickets have been placed on sale at Power & Estes' drug store.

The officials have not been all chosen. Frank Loneragan will be the field judge.—Journal.

FIGHT OFFERS FAKISH

New York, Nov. 12.—A prominent sporting man close to James J. Jeffries declared today that the fabulous offers for the fight between Jack Johnson and Jeffries were all wind bids. Not one of them, he said, was bona fide, nor had it been backed with a certified check. The promoters who are in a position to stage the fight, he said, are holding off in the fear that they will run the bidding up too high.

LUCAS AND O'NEIL

LOSE FIGHT AT MEMPHIS

Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 11.—President W. H. Lucas, of the Northwest League, and Norris L. O'Neil, of the Western League, lost their fight in the National Association of Minor Leagues here today. Lucas and O'Neil conducted a campaign against the recommendation of the committee on revision of constitution that the National Association renew its agreement for ten years, or until September 6, 1921. The opponents of this suggestion contended next year would be a better time to renew the agreement. They were alone in the fight and lost.

The extension of the life of the National Association of Professional Baseball Clubs until September 6, 1921, and the selection of Chicago as the next meeting place, were features of the annual meeting of the association.

In a furious drive of twenty miles, every moment of which he was closely pressed from behind, he set a new mark of 16:42.76. This is 11.4 seconds better than Oldfield's record at Indianapolis.

It is rumored that she will soon be married to a wealthy citizen of Tacoma, but the name of the supposed fiancée could not be obtained.

Speaking today of the divorce, which was granted late yesterday afternoon after a brief hearing in court, Judge Massey, who represented Miss Illington, said: "Frohman not only refused to support his wife, but he charged her with cab fares to and from the theatre when she was acting for him, and he told her he married her for business considerations only, because together they could make a lot of money."
