## FOREIGN MARRIAGES BRING GRIEF TO AMERICAN HEIRESSSES

London, Nov. 13.—The marriage of Marquis Antoine de Charette to Miss Suzanne Herring has attracted much attention on this side of the water, and today's ceremony in New York is looked upon as the culmination of a real international romance. As neither the bridegroom nor the bride is wealthy, the prime consideration which usually enters into such "love" affairs is absent in this instance. Indeed, those who pretend to know state that the Marquis is more bountifully supplied with this world's goods than is his bride.

The Marquis is said to be a thrifty person, with considerable knowledge of the value of money—a characteristic almost unknown among the nobles of the decaying French aristocracy. He was given an exhibition of this thrift by leaving on this side the many beautiful presents intended for today's bride, in order to avoid the payment of American duties.

The gift from royal personages come from the connections of General de Charette, head of the French Royalists in Brittany, where his ancestor, the vendee chief, was shot by the Republicans in 1797.

Among donors are the Queen of Portugal, the Duke of Orleans, the Duke de Charette, the Countess de Paris and the Count de Caserte, the Duke de Rohan, the Duke de Lorge and the Duke de Cases.

One of the gifts is a bejeweled sword, which the Pontifical Zouaves, former comrades in arms of General de Charette, have presented. There are, again, historic diamonds, diamonds lace from the Baronne de Charette. The aunt of the bridegroom presents the bride with the richest of all the gifts, a diadem of diamond laurel leaves. The giver is Mlle. Henriette de Charette.

**Royal Birthdays.**  
This year the birthdays of King Edward and King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, come in the same week. Edward's birthday was celebrated Tuesday, while that of the Italian monarch was on Thursday. Victor Emmanuel was born November 11th, 1869, so that he is now forty years of age.

While the King was the recipient of many congratulations, the popular demonstration in his honor was overshadowed by the demonstration arranged by the Anarchists of Rome.

**St. Martin's Day.**  
St. Martin's Day was observed in England in the customary manner today, and the official weather forecasters had to take a back seat. The least superstitious of Englishmen still entertain a sneaking belief in the ancient "poem":

If November eleventh is cold and clear,  
Then the winter will be severe;  
But if that day be stormy, child,  
The next four months will all be mild.

So runs the old saw in which is embodied the popular superstition of St. Martin's influence over the weather. Elected to the See of Tours in 374, St. Martin converted his whole diocese from paganism to Christianity. He died November 11, 397, and, in accordance with old church custom, his day is celebrated by ritualistic churches the world over on the anniversary of his death.
