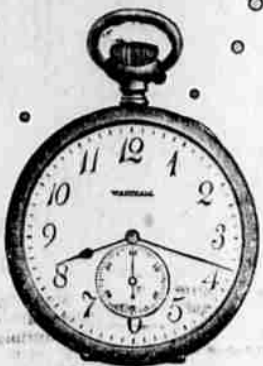

MOUNT SCOTT STORE BURNS

R. D. Crow's Grocery almost Total Loss—Building Damaged

The R. D. Crow grocery stock, in Mount Scott, was almost totally destroyed by fire last night, and that part of the one-story business block occupied by the place was likewise badly damaged by the flames, making the aggregate loss approximately \$5000. Of this amount \$2500 was sustained by the Crow interests. Both losses are fully covered by insurance. The owner of the building is W. Stryker.

The cause of the fire is unknown. The nearest fire station is almost two miles away, and the flames gained such great headway it was impossible to save the store, though the other three storerooms adjoining suffered little loss. The firemen were also hampered by a lack of water, which was obtainable only from private hydrants.

Shortly before 12 o'clock an alarm was sounded from box 42, at First and Morrison streets. A late lodger in the new Occidental House had left his chair on the bed, and from this a fire started. Chemicals were used in extinguishing the flames and only slight damage was done.—Oregonian
