"Current Events," the paper which
the students of the seventh and
eighth grades subscribed for, first ar-

the students subscribing, and on the
following day the whole class re-
solved itself into a Current Event Club,
which discussed and recited the
events of the week. It is planned to
allow thirty minutes each week for
this purpose.

Professor Robinson considers a
knowledge of present day history an
indispensable part of a student's
training. Such knowledge, he says,
both creates an interest and gives a
basis for the comprehension of past
history in its true proportions and at
the same time is a means of afford-
ing a grasp of the immediate pres-
ent. While it is true the past must
be the guide to the future, yet he who
lives by the past alone virtually lives
in the past. And although the soft

light of the past seems sufficient for
our feet, yet we amid the dazzling
splendor of the present must search
out the signboard along our way. The
life, the thoughts, the movements of
our times, are these signboards. If
the human race is to have a conscious
part in the control of the life, thought
or movements of the future, it must
be conscious of what the present is
for, only then can it prescribe or ac-
curate elements that will tend to-
ward its ideal of the future.

These papers are well fitted for
supplying the demands of the upper
grades of the elementary schools.
And under the guidance of the teach-
ers, who must show the importance
and connection of the events, it seems
entirely possible that the class may
acquire a grasp of the tendencies of
the times and a power for making ev-
olutions in politics and in the social
and ethical fields.
