GREAT CUSTOMS FRAUDS UNCOVERED

Government Defrauded by Undervaluation of Goods

Washington, Nov. 12.—Through a verbal report rendered to Secretary of the Treasury MacVaugh this afternoon by Marion De Vries, of the Board of General Appraisers, and Dr. Frank Lloyd, deputy assistant attorney-general for the new Customs Court, it was learned that the United States had been getting the worst of it in the matter of customs revenue at the leading ports of entry on both oceans. To the story of corruption and improper administration at New York, which have caused the government to lose millions of dollars, is now added a story of undervaluation affecting imports entering at San Francisco, the losses from which are tremendous, although no actual figures have been given.

Overhaul Every Custom House.

With the latest knowledge gained regarding losses suffered by the Treasury on goods coming into the country from both sides, Mr. MacVaugh is aroused more than ever to the necessity for a thorough housecleaning with respect to the whole customs service.

There is to be an overhauling of affairs in every custom-house in the country, those on the inland lakes to be delved into as well as those located at ports on the seaboard. When the housecleaning is completed, which will be as soon as possible consistent with thoroughness, Uncle Sam will add annually to his strong box millions of dollars that heretofore have been kept from him by dishonest, lax methods and undervaluation.

PORTLAND ACADEMY DEFEATS LINCOLN HIGH

Portland, Nov. 12.—Outplayed in almost every department of the game and never making yards, Portland Academy won over Lincoln High school yesterday afternoon on Multnomah field, by 14 to 6, the largest score that has been made this season in the interscholastic league.

The contest was replete with sensational features, Cobb and Wilson furnishing the most spectacular events, when they interrupted forward passes, as the high school was about to score, and sprinted the length of the field for touchdowns. Each run was a great surprise, and the Academy rosters went joy mad, as they had rather expected to be defeated.

Luck seemed to have a little grudge against the high school players, and fumbles did the rest. Time and again, by superb line bucking and end runs, the high school marched down the field to within striking distance of the Academy goal line, only to lose the ball through fumbles and poor passes and have their advantages turned to scores for Portland Academy.

Harry Wilson, cashier of the bank, spread the alarm and a crowd of citizens, armed with shotguns, rifles and revolvers, pursued the boy robbers across the fields. In attempting to swim the Kaw River the boys lost ground and a few minutes later the mob was at their heels. McKay surrendered but Bullock, wrenching the revolver from his falling partner's hands, sped into a patch in the woods.

John Miller, a farmer, unconnected with the pursuit, stepped into Bullock's path and Bullock, thinking him an enemy, fired. His shot missed Miller, and the posse, seeing the youth was ready to shoot, fired a score of shots.

Bullock returned the fire. Then realizing that he was about to be captured, he shot himself through the head.

CLIMAX REACHED IN AUTO RACES

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 12.—Today's automobile races reached their climax when George H. Robertson, driving a 60-horse power Fiat, lowered the American track record for 50 miles by :04:07. He made the distance in 49:14.2.

The previous record was held by John N. Aiken, who drove a National second in today's race, and Stillman, who came in third in a Marmon, both bettered the Indianapolis mark. Aiken made the distance in 41:11.41, and Stillman in 43:30.56.

Eight cars started and five finished. Louis Strang, piloting his 200-horse-power Fiat, set a terrific pace in the first 15 miles, but in the 18th, as he was passing the judge's stand, the tire of his rear wheel exploded. This compelled his withdrawal, as it was impossible, owing to the special design of the car, to make a quick replacement of tires. His time for the first ten miles was :07:18.32.
