The plan of holding practice in secret behind locked gates has not been found to have worked to advantage at Corvallis. If it has not done any harm. The one thing that it has done has been to start a report or confirm a general opinion that the team is C. O. D. and that the games would all be easy for their opponents. This idea has killed much of the football spirit and besides, the poor attendance at Saturday's game, little disappointment or feeling was shown at the defeat. Some, indeed, who did not see the game, when they heard the score, felt that the college had done well. The Corvallis men, however, failed to indicate the nearly equal strength of the Corvallis men, who played at an extreme disadvantage by the loss of Keck, their punter.

It is very probable that the "big" excursion to Eugene from Corvallis to Friday's football game will not be anywhere near what was expected, nor nearly as large as most of the previous excursions. It has been stated that O. A. C. would send this year a crowd of at least 2000, or 800 more than last year, but now it is

likely to be the excursion will be much longer than the year. There are several reasons for this. C. team wrong, for all but about two hundred to remain in Corvallis.

Bill Hayward, always non-committal, seemed more pleased than worried over the outlook. He said, however, that the boys were in very bad shape. "We're going to have a very hard game with Corvallis." As far as our chances with Washington are concerned they look favorable if we are to make good Friday."

Forbes' men are now beginning to be a team and from now on will show what they are, and what the eastern system of coaching can do against a system of the west. It will be a test of the relative merits of the two systems of coaching, applied to the conditions of the Northwest. Even more than a struggle between two strong elevens it will be a personal affair between coaches, the astute Forbes, of Minnesota, and the aggressive star, on the one side, and the plucky coach of Yale, twice a member of the all-American team, on the other. And on the result hangs not only this year's championship, but very probably the kind of football that will hereafter be played generally in the Northwest.
