ROBBED OF SPOILS

Thugs Take \$659 Check from Manager of Football Team

Members of the Idaho football team, which played Oregon in Portland last Saturday, had an exciting time near Colfax, Wash., Sunday night when Henry Smith, their manager, was robbed of a check for \$659, representing Idaho's entire share of the gate receipts at the game. The news was received here yesterday, when Smith sent a rush telegram to Manager Goodman, of the University of Oregon, to have payment on the check stopped.

Smith, who is himself a track athlete, and called "Hercules" because of his great strength, was strolling along the platform of a small station, where the train had stopped, when two men seized him by the arms.

Before he could resist they went through his pockets, taking the check, and disappeared. The team had their tickets paid for and enough spare cash left to get back to the University town of Moscow.

The check was on the Hibernian Bank, of Portland. The Oregon manager wired the bank not to honor it if presented.

OREGON WILL HAVE NO WALKOVER

There seems to be a general opinion among the football dopesters that Oregon will have an easy game with Corvallis next Friday, but can hardly expect to defeat Washington. They have based their opinions mostly from comparative scores, and are for this reason in the wrong. The game next Friday with O. A. C. will be a very hard struggle, still if Oregon can defeat them by any safe margin they have a very good chance at Washington. The score of 18 to 9 did not show the relative strength of the two teams, for aside from the difference in punting, Corvallis nearly equalled Washington in every stage of the game. Keck, Corvallis' punter, was unable to play because of a bad foot, but he will play against Oregon, and if he can play he will be a dangerous man. Endberg is very dangerous at right half. He was good for five and ten yards through Washington's line.

For Oregon Walker, the remarkable freshman half, may be unable to play, as he was pretty badly used up

Saturday. Clark may play and he may not, and the latter is the most probable. His foot is in very bad condition. If any one feels that Oregon will have an easy time with O. A. C. this year they are going to be badly fooled. O. A. C. has purposely been giving the impression that their team was weak in order to give Oregon over-confidence and surprise them, and Saturday's defeat helped them.

BROWN PRESIDENT

OF THE A. A. U.

New York, Nov. 15.—Everett C. Brown, of Chicago, was elected president of the Amateur Athletic Union at the annual meeting today, succeeding James E. Sullivan, who had held the office for three years. Mr. Sullivan was chosen secretary-treasurer. He declined re-election to the presidency. The Southern California Athletic Association was admitted to membership, and a new rule adopted, designed to protect young athletes from overstrain. By this regulation competitors less than 16 years old are barred from races exceeding five miles.

NEW BLEACHERS FOR

O. A. C.-OREGON GAME

In preparation for the record-breaking crowd which will attend the football game in this city next Friday, additional bleachers have been constructed on Kincaid field. The old bleachers built last year will be given over to the Corvallis contingent, who are expected to come fully 2000 strong. The work was done entirely by students, who volunteered their services in response to Manager Goodman's request for more seating capacity on the field.

GAME WARDEN

HIMSELF GUILTY

Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 15.—Deputy Game Warden Brumfield pleaded guilty a few days ago to hunting without a license. It was reported here that State Game Warden Stevenson had asked for Brumfield's resignation, but he is still on the job and has half a dozen prosecutions yet to file.

Records show that Brumfield has secured more convictions than any other warden in the state. He has served two jail sentences for killing deer out of season and "bootlegging."

REV. PEEBLES SPOKE ON

DEISM AND THEISM

In his sermon Sunday evening Rev. Mr. Peebles spoke upon the topic, "Deism and Theism." The four words, deism, theism, atheism and pantheism were treated, the two last very briefly. The two words, deism and theism, should mean the same thing, but strange to say quite a wide difference has crept into their general meaning and use. In some way deism has come to signify a belief in a God who originated certain laws and principles and then left the work of creation to these laws, abdicated in their favor or delegated his power.

On the other hand theism signifies a god still working, creating and everywhere active.

Lives of great men, contemporaries, and often of the same family, were compared, where widely different religious views were held. Why this divergence? Was not each of God? An interesting incident of personal correspondence with the celebrated Helen Keller was given. The speaker was able to announce that it was quite possible that the secretary of the American Unitarian Association of Boston would visit Eugene perhaps in March next. This was gratifying, as it shows that the work being done here is attracting some attention.

A good audience greeted the speaker. Next Sunday Mr. Peebles will exchange with the Unitarian pastor of Salem.
