THUG LOADED DOWN WITH STOLEN LOOT

Man Captured by Marshal At Cottage Grove Bad Man

Scared by the Cottage Grove marshal's "billie," carrying a big .44 Colts, a bowie knife, a dozen stolen rings, a big book of postoffice stamps and other loot, a desperate-looking character giving the name of Robert J. Blake was brought to the United States marshal's office this morning by Deputy Marshal Becker. He is the man believed to have robbed several railway depots in the Willamette valley and the Irving postoffice. In addition to these crimes, the accused has on his person evidence of having entered many residences. His demeanor, the loot carried and the formidable armament combine to make the officials feel that they have a hard case in hand, whose record will probably unfold a dozen or more crimes.

Marshal Snodgrass, of Cottage Grove, ran on the man by chance. He was visiting the railway grounds as usual, to make the hobos move on. There he found a half dozen gathered about a big bonfire. He ordered them to surrender, with the purpose of making them all go to the city hall. Blake began edging away very rapidly.

Tries to Pull Gun
Noting his conduct the marshal thought that something might be wrong, and that Blake was not an ordinary hobo. He gave chase to the one, letting the other hobos go. As the marshal closed with Blake, the latter was seen to be tugging at his hip pocket, as if to draw a gun. Without waiting for further developments the marshal went in to close quarters with his club, and succeeded in dropping his man after a violent struggle. When Blake revived slightly from the knockout he began tugging to get out his bowie knife, but was handcuffed before further resistance was possible.

Search revealed a mass of loot. A set of keys taken from one of the depot masters of the Southern Pacific railway was in the lot. Also the lot of stamps believed to have been taken from Irving. Jewelry was plentiful, all indicating that it had been taken from a farmhouse. The revolver was of the Colt's army pattern, a most formidable weapon, and a belt filled with cartridges showed the business purpose of carrying it. On the bowie knife was blood, which seemed to have been from the owner, rather than a victim. Around the revolver had been wrapped a handkerchief so it would fit better in the holster, and not fall out when the owner was running, which explained why Blake could not draw his gun quickly when attacked.—Portland Telegram.

INJURED GIRLS NOW

ALL DIFFERENT STORY

Daisy Platt and Ina Brown Say They Drank Nothing At Road House

Ina Brown, one of the girls injured when an automobile driven by Arthur E. Mitchell collided with a buggy in which were riding Dr. S. D. Briggs and family, on the Base Line road Sunday night, stated last night that when she said whiskey was drunk by herself and Daisy Platt at the Twelve-Mile House, she told an untruth. She says now that all the whiskey either received was given them from a flask, emptied into two cups, at the house where they were taken after the accident.

Both girls were closely questioned in their rooms at the Good Samaritan hospital by the grand jury, but clung to their assertion that they had received no liquor at Merrill's place. Merrill was at the hospital yesterday, but by order of the grand jury was not permitted to see either of the girls. Dr. A. W. Moore, who attended the injured persons, was a witness before the grand jury this morning.

Mitchell is reported to be in a semi-conscious condition today, but is yet unable to talk. A clot of blood is said to rest upon his brain. The attending physician is sanguine of his recovery, but his condition is admitted to be critical.—Telegram.
