

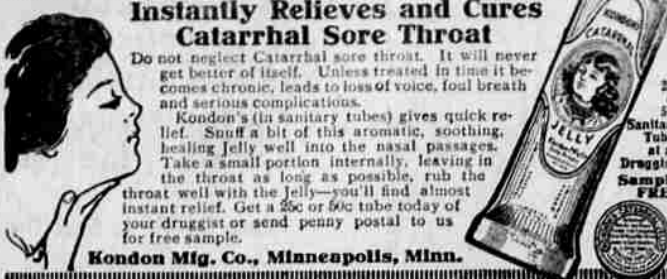

YALE-HARVARD

GAME TOMORROW

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 19.—It is the day before "the game." Excitement is at the point proverbially known as "fever heat." Business in Cambridge is almost suspended, while everybody, from a banker down to a bootblack, discusses in earnest tones the chances of the crimson in the morrow's contest with the blue.

The man from Mars, dropping in casually, would think the townsmen were on the eve of a great battle, with life or death hanging in the balance.

As the day advances, Cambridge begins to take on animation. Trains and trolleys bring to town the advance guards of the blue army, and here and there in the streets of the Village a blue flag, relieving the monotony of the all-prevailing crimson. The visitors are beginning to flash real money in the faces of Harvard adherents, and are finding ready takers. The freshmen and sophomores are testing their voices, in intermittent and defiant cries, for tomorrow's verbal outburst. The yells are principally designed to advertise Harvard, but now and then an interloper perks up his nerve, and lets out a resounding squeak about the greatness and glory of Yale, and immediately hunts cover. All in all, everything indicates that it is the day before "the game."

As to the chance of victory in tomorrow's game, that is as may be. Any Harvard man can give facts, figures and statistics to prove John Harvard's inalienable right to a repetition of last year's victory, with footnotes proving that the Eli bunch can't possibly win. The Yale man has a story equally convincing, and there you are. The wise course seems to be to keep your money to bet on a horse race or some other sure thing.

The comparative showings of the two eleven against West Point is considered to be the best dope on tomorrow's game, but they don't prove much. West Point experts pronounced Yale the strongest football bunch that ever bore down on the Point. The tragedy which resulted in the death of Cadet Byrne drove all idea of comparison between Harvard and Yale from the immediate thought of the experts, but up to the time the game was stopped Harvard had done enough to convince the lookers on that Harvard, too, had an array of talent such as is not often seen at the Point. A battle of football giants seems to be what is coming in Cambridge.

Harvard's line attack was further along than Yale's against the army, a condition to be expected with Harvard having two more weeks of preparation.

Harvard and Yale showed about the same defensive strength, which was ample to keep their goal lines safe. Going against two opposing lines West Point could make no material impression against either. West Point got around the Yale ends more than around Harvard extremities, but no more so once Yale began stopping these plays. In defense against plays in the open the two "varsity" teams did equally well except that Yale was more alert and adept at coping with the inside kick.

Harvard ran back a good many West Point punts a short distance, but did not get in the long journeys in running back punts that Yale did. The army's tackling had made great improvement between the two games, and was cleaner and sharper against Harvard, but for all that the Harvard backs did not get away as fast when running back a punt as the Yale men, and did not keep going so hard.

"From what I have been able to see and hear, Harvard is dangerous," says Walter Camp. "She is supporting her runners more than ever, and that means danger. She is also aggressive, and no matter what position she finds herself in she will fight and fight hard, as was shown in the Brown game."

"Team work, however, is not as important as it used to be, and the success of the team today depends on the ability of each individual player. I feel that I can safely say that the present Yale team possesses more expert knowledge of the game indi-

vidually than any other team that Yale has ever seen.

"In a big game the player has a dozen or more opportunities today to use his individual judgment and to use it quickly. Knowledge of the game is therefore quite essential, and I am certain that our men understand the game well enough to detect trick plays."

DOBBIE GETS SOME APPRECIATION NOW

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 18.—Graduate Manager Victor Zednick recommended the re-election of Gilmore Dobbie as football coach at the University of Washington for the next year, at a meeting of the student body of control this evening. He will also ask that Dobbie be given a substantial increase in salary. Zednick ascertained the sentiment of the board of control before determining his recommendation, and there is no doubt but that Dobbie will be re-elected. All the members of the athletic board of control are satisfied with Dobbie's work this season, and will bring all possible pressure to bear to induce him to change his mind about quitting.

Dobbie's salary this year was \$1600, and increase of \$600 over his salary for 1908. Dobbie announced several days ago that he positively would not accept re-election. His connection with the University of Washington up to that time had been none too pleasant.

PLENTY OF TALK,

BUT NO MONEY

New York, Nov. 18.—More than \$1,000,000 in the aggregate has been offered by different clubs throughout America and Europe for the Jeffries-Johnson fight, but according to "Bob" Murphy, official stakeholder, not a penny has been posted by any of the ambitious promoters.

"All of these offers have been made apparently in good faith," said Mr. Murphy, "but I must admit that none has been accompanied by the \$1500 deposit which the articles of agreement specified. The bids will be opened in less than two weeks, but there has not been an offer made yet under the conditions called for in the articles of agreement."

The stakeholder's admission practically narrows the field to rival California promoters. Jeffries said: "It makes no difference where the fight is held or under whose auspices, but at the beginning there must be a sound assurance that the fight will be permitted. The California promoters appear to be the only men who can guarantee the battle."

CONGRESS MAY

PASS LAWS ON FOOTBALL GAME

Washington, Nov. 18.—Legislation to prevent brutality in football and possibly to actually prohibit the playing of the game is likely to follow the mortality which has marked contests this season. The district commissioners now have corporation counsel at work on the subject, and if the situation can be handled by the police regulation, congress will be asked to pass a bill which the district commissioners will draft.

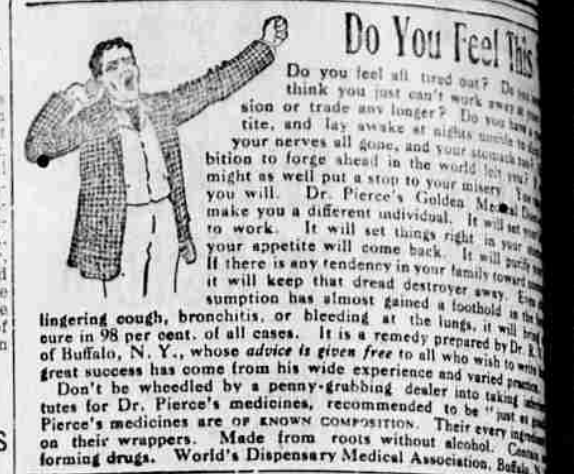

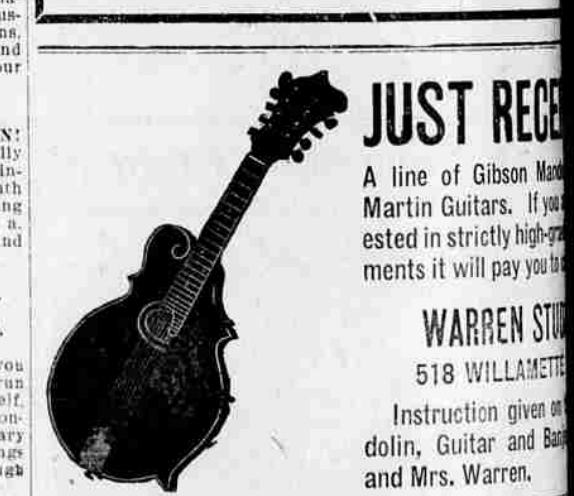
