635 ACRES TO BE PLANTED TO FRUIT NEAR CRESWELL

To clear, plow, prepare and set to fruit 635 acres of land requires a large amount of both work and money, and is a big undertaking for any company, yet this is what the A. C. Bohmstedt Company is doing at Creswell, says the Chronicle. Six hundred and thirty-five acres of good fruit land is there in the famous Willamette Valley will be set this fall and winter. Every acre of this land has been inspected and selected by as competent judges of horticulture as can be found, Hon. W. K. Newell, president of the State Board of Horticulture, and S. Shotwell.

25 Men Employed.

To do this work 25 men are employed, five three-horse teams, and three two-horse teams. Clearing and plowing has been going on for some time. Last week surveyors were put to work laying out the orchard and this week the work of digging the holes and setting the trees began. The orchards will be principally apples, with some peaches, pears and cherries.

Sold in Small Tracts.

The orchards sold in five, ten and twenty-acre tracts and upward. They are set, cultivated and cared for by the company for a period of five years.

The main entrance to the company's land is six blocks from the business part of town. On the street which leads to the entrance and within one block of same is situated the school public. This street runs north and south the entire length of the tract and is crossed by three streets. The road passing through the Hawley place runs to the river, a distance of a mile and a quarter. On each side of the road its entire length will be planted English walnut trees. These trees thrive and yield abundantly in this locality, and besides being a source of revenue, are an ideal ornamental shade tree. On the Reed place north of the Hawley farm are two streets each three-quarters of a mile in length.

Comprised in this tract of land are six of the best farms in this locality.

P. & E. RAILROAD TO USE AUTOMOBILES

Medford, Or., Nov. 19.—Arrangements have been made whereby the Pacific & Eastern railroad will co-operate with the Southern Pacific in taking tourists to Crater Lake. The road plans to operate an automobile line from the end of its extension to Crater Lake and from there down to Klamath Falls, where the Southern Pacific can again be taken by travelers.

namely: The R. D. Hawley, Reed, Chenoweth, Hillegas, Martin and Piere places. Of the Hawley farm, 225 acres will be planted, 110 of the Reed, 70 of the Chenoweth, and 230 of the Hillegas, Martin and Piere farms. Fifty acres were planted last spring.

To set this ground 45,000 trees will be used, setting 70 trees to the acre. Seventy-seven thousand trees are now in the company's nursery and in addition to these, 100,000 have been ordered from France. These will arrive yet this fall, and ground has been reserved on which another nursery will set. It is also the intention of the company to set several acres to grapes, berries and small fruit.

Erect Bungalows.

The company has erected two bungalows. One contains ten rooms and was built and furnished at a cost of \$3000. The other residence has six rooms is valued at \$1150. Resident families reside on four of the farms and the men at work on the property board at these places.

In undertaking a work of this magnitude the vast amount of money expended would accomplish but little if the men placed in charge of the work were not competent in the highest degree. He makes regular semi-monthly visits to the company holdings here, which are under his supervision, and inspects thoroughly every branch of the work.

IDAHO BANK OFFICIALS UNDER INVESTIGATION

Moscow, Idaho, Nov. 18.—The federal grand jury, which has been investigating the Lewiston National Bank shortage, reported this afternoon, the first true bill being filed in the secret records of Clerk Richardson. The grand jury made only a partial report, but it is believed true bills were returned against officials or employees or former officials and former employees of the bank. The resumption of deliberations indicate that further bills will be voted. The indictment returned this afternoon were short, covering only one or two pages. Tonight the office force of the Assistant Attorney-General, Peyton Gordon, is working and it is believed indictments are being drawn which will be returned tomorrow or Saturday.

There is much curiosity as to who will be held responsible for \$137,000, but it is generally believed that F. W. Kettenbach, president; W. F. Kettenbach, ex-president, and George H. Kester, ex-cashier, will be indicted with Clarence W. Robnett. It is said that J. E. Chapman, extorter, who is accused of abstractions and false entries, will not be held by the grand jury.

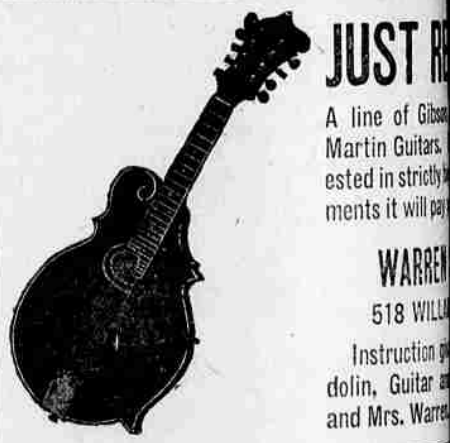
