IN THE World of Sport

30 DEAD, 216 HURT, FOOTBALL'S TOLL Season Is Only 67 Days Old. But the Death List Is Grim

Chicago, Nov. 21.—Football has claimed its annual toll. Thirty dead, 216 crippled, many for life, scores still hovering on the brink of death in the surgical wards of hospitals throughout the land—that's the tale of the gridiron covering a period of 67 days. The figures of football's toll for 1909 down to date are as follows:

Total deaths, 30.
Total injured, 216.
College players killed, 8.
High school players killed, 20.
Athletic members killed, 2.
College players injured, 171.
High school players injured, 40.
Athletic members injured, 5.
The open game, hailed to be sans brutality by college enthusiasts, has wrought fearful havoc. Twenty of the dead were schoolboys under 20 years of age. Eight college men, properly trained for bruising encounters, were sacrificed, while only two members of athletic clubs or semi-professional teams were placed on the altar.

SALEM H. S. TEAM IN POOR CONDITION

The local High school football team is slowly rounding into shape for the Eugene game. The practice has been very unsatisfactory owing to the continued illness of Captain Eyre and Barriek. Without these men the Salem line is very mediocre, and their absence on Thanksgiving means a serious handicap for Salem. The work of the ends is steadily improving, and the men cover their positions far more satisfactorily than in the earlier games. The work of the ends, with Kaiser punting, will be Salem's main chance to score.

The attack of the local's backfield lacks steam. The men slow up at the critical time, and have not been hitting the line with any force. In recent practicing the plunging has not been good. The tackles carry the ball well, and will have to be called on frequently. Salem's hope lies in the concerted efforts of her team, as she has yet failed to uncover any star.

A large crowd of rooters will take the team to Eugene on a special train. —Statesman.

WILL SEND AWAY PICTURE BOOKLETS

The Springfield Commercial Club will send a large number of the Springfield picture booklets East and to California. They will be sent, before, by parties going away. The plan of sending advertising to California and other Western states is a very good scheme of the club. It is quite often that Easterners come to the West by advertisements of the railroads and others and find California is not what they wanted, and when they see the literature from Oregon they are able to make a short trip to visit and see for themselves. They generally come back. Besides sending the booklets, more of the "Study the Map" doggers will be sent. A large number of the picture booklets have just arrived, being delayed somewhere between here and the printers. The others have been out several weeks. Besides Springfield, Albany, Eugene, Salem and several other towns have had them published in some form.

COMMERCIAL CLUB

ELECTION SOON

Already there is some little talk over the election of officers of the Springfield Commercial Club, which occurs next month. There will be several vacancies to fill, and the present growing condition of Springfield will place a large amount of respon-

sible work on the shoulders of the incumbents for the following year, making it a necessity to secure the most efficient and wide-awake men. Mr. Keatly, who as president has done so much for the club, has moved to Eugene. Mr. Walker, who has devoted a large amount of time to the over-worked office of secretary, feels that he will be unable to continue the work. This leaves these two offices open to be filled by wide-awake men. Besides the vice president, a board of directors has to be elected.

LET MAIN STREET ALONE THIS WINTER

Probably nothing will be done to Main street this winter or next spring until the electric road is laid, and then the street can be repaired for good. Although the P. E. & E. has no franchise now, one will be granted before spring, as a petition for a franchise was read some weeks ago, but it was unsatisfactory and was returned. Because the company did not start work under the old franchise within the limit set, they will have to pay more for the new one. Bonds will be required and the company must pay its share for the macadam pavement that has been laid this year on the right-of-way to be. Some think that a five-cent fare from Main street to Willamette street should also be asked, but this provision is not probable.

campa had celery on the tables yesterday, for some 1950 pounds of the plant were shipped there Saturday. This is only an example of what goes up every day. No less than an average of two carloads go up every day, consisting of implements and other supplies. There are twice as many carloads consigned to Natron than there are to Springfield at present.

At present the sawmill is turning away many men each day who are applying for work. Labor has been very plentiful since the railroad construction began. Although the camps are paying better wages than the mill laborers have to pay a dollar a day for board, leaving them only a dollar or a dollar and a half a day clear. Besides this, they are very frequently laid off for a day or two, which means no wages, while they have to pay board. The wages at the mill range from \$2 up.

W. C. Lyons has opened a pop corn stand on the south side of Main street east of the postoffice.

There has been no spread of diphtheria from the one case in Springfield, which is rapidly improving. The typhoid epidemic up the river is becoming less pronounced.

The "jiffy" wagon, since it has raised the fare to ten cents, does not carry nearly so many passengers as before, although its proprietors say it is paying as good profits, for the loads are lighter.

The sawmill did not shut down on Friday for the football game, but its men were given the privilege of lay-off if they wished. About twenty took advantage of the opportunity, which included nearly all the retail force.

The new dynamo cannot be installed at the mill until a shipment of wire, which has been delayed somewhere, arrives from Portland.
