SHINGLE MILL IN PROSPECT AT FLORENCE

H. J. Humphrey, of Elma,
Wash., Looking Over
Situation

A big shingle mill is among the new enterprises that are under consideration for Florence, and likely to be established here in the next few months.

H. J. Humphrey, who came here a few days ago from Elma, Wash., is looking over the country to ascertain the amount of cedar timber in this vicinity and the opportunities of getting a supply of logs for manufacturing shingles. He was here a day or two about three weeks ago, and was so much pleased with the outlook that he returned to investigate further.

Mr. Humphrey represents several shingle manufacturing firms, and seems quite confident that one or more of them will put up a mill here. A mill of this kind, such as these firms operate in Washington, with a capacity of 150,000 to 200,000 shingles a day, would bring more people here to reside and make homes for themselves and their families.

The mill would carry a payroll of \$1000 to \$1500 per month, besides the number of men employed in the woods getting out logs and bolts.—Florence West.

CORVALLIS PAPER'S CRITICISM ON EUGENE

Editor of Gazette-Times Was
Here For Game Friday and
Makes Observations

The Corvallis Gazette-Times editor was in Eugene Friday and saw the football game. He went home and wrote the following concerning Eugene:

Eugene's Commercial Club building looks better in pictures than it does at first hand. The downstairs entrance to the club wouldn't impress one, and the out-fitting company in one of the first floor rooms would make one think he was going into a machine shop rather than up to the Commercial Club, and to think our old friend Hartog has stood for this situation!

Corvallis mud doesn't look any more satisfactory after a day spent on Eugene's bitulthie pavement.

The electric fountain at the station is all right, only a little more water would help.

With all of Hartog's talk about cleaning up Eugene, he failed to get people to clean up back yards, alley ways and streets across which the Southern Pacific runs. The C. & E. runs through a section of Corvallis that looks up much better than anything seen at Eugene from the S. P. train.

Eugene was very gaily decorated in honor of the occasion. Flags were hung in profusion and pole decorations, in design, added to the splendor.

At night the festoons of electric lights, reaching from the station to the head of the principal street, were ablaze. All of this was charming and duly appreciated as a great compliment.

Eugene has a great deal of plank walk, and some of it is not so far from the principal thoroughfare, either.

The University city has one fine stone church, and two or three church edifices with spires higher than our own, but about some of these churches is much of the "tall uncut" as any one can see on any lot in Corvallis.

The Lane county capital city has many fine trees. Many great pines have been preserved, and it all helps. Aside from the magnificent I. O. O. F. building, five stories, and the \$125,000 hotel now in course of erection, Eugene has no extraordinary business buildings. But the little city has many two and three-story buildings that look solid, substantial, and of distinctly creditable architecture because of their simplicity. The older buildings show that the fool architect who put 20,000 unsightly bay windows, cupolas and spires on Portland business houses was copied at Eugene. It's too bad that fellow did not get switched to the North Pole before he landed in Oregon.

The opening of W. O. W. hall as headquarters for O. A. C. was exactly the proper thing. But for this the 1200 who went from this section could not have been fed, and would have had no place to rest. As it was, they were served with fair meals at 35 cents each and had a place to leave their trappings. This was a great convenience.

Every O. A. C. enthusiast wants Oregon to wallop Washington to the limit. O. A. C. without a punter was beaten by Washington 18 to 0. O. A. C. with one of the best punters ever seen in the West was beaten by Oregon 12 to 0. That ought to mean that Oregon is fully the equal, if not stronger, than Washington. Oregon must win—we want that championship.

Oregon cheered lustily for O. A. C. a number of times; a very pretty compliment. O. A. C. returned the courtesy occasionally.

SECRETARY BALLINGER ISSUES STATEMENT

Washington, Nov. 21.—Secretary of the Interior Ballinger today followed up his reply to the attack made in a magazine on his action regarding the Deschutes River Railroad right of way by making a detailed reply to the same writer's attack on his conduct with regard to the Cunningham coal land entries in Alaska.

"To say that I ever have advised, ordered or lent support to any effort to perpetrate a fraud upon the Government," he said, "is not only false but is intentionally so, if made by anyone who has taken the trouble to inquire into the facts."

In explanation of the charges in connection with the Alaska coal lands, he went into the history of from entry of all coal lands of Alaska in 1906, showing that the order was so modified by Secretary Garfield as to validate all applications made prior to May 16, 1907.

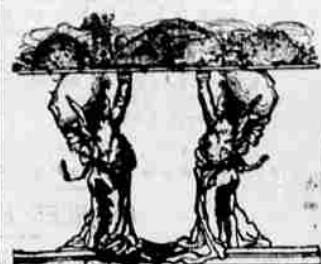
