WEEK'S NEWS AND REVIEWS OF AMERICA'S GREAT CITY

Guard Special Service.

New York, Nov. 23.—Thanksgiving Day affords the metropolitan "epicure" an opportunity to "tune up" for the Christmas feast, and the New York debauch, and, if the number of turkeys coming to town is any criterion, none will lack a share in next Thursday's festivities. The estimate of the number of gobblers to be offered as a sacrifice to New York appetites next week takes a wide range, but it is likely that not short of a million of the Thanksgiving birds will be consumed. Those who cannot afford turkey will have chicken or duck, and for the poorest, the Salvation Army and other charitable organizations will attempt to provide a share of the abounding good cheer.

There are 200,000 persons in New York who never get a square meal except once a year—on Thanksgiving day—according to a veteran worker for one of the city's charitable organizations. Of course, not all of this great army is made up of unemployed or dependent persons, but it represents those who are habitually underfed. On Thanksgiving day, however, it is the proud boast of Father Knickerbocker that nobody need go hungry within his gates. Dinners at each of which thousands are fed are given by the charitable institutions and by Tammany politicians like the Sullivan of the lower East Side, who this year are planning a "feed" for some 3000 Boweryites, regardless of political affiliation, although that usually may be taken for granted. The dinners of this sort already announced will be sufficient for 75,000 persons, while the free basket meals distributed to the poor families in the tenements probably will aggregate an equal number. Aside from all this there are thousands of well-to-do men and women who make a practice of supplying Thanksgiving cheer to a number of families less

fortunately circumstanced. This form of help will reach 50,000 more, so that it is safe to say that practically nobody in New York will be suffering from hunger on Thanksgiving day, a condition that could not be duplicated on any other day in the year. Even the immigrants on Ellis Island get their first introduction to the typical American holiday by a rousing dinner in which turkey and cranberry sauce figure. It is characteristic of New York to pay special attention to the favorite form of Thanksgiving day charity, for there is no city in the country where good eating and plenty of it is held in higher esteem.

Teddy Bear No More

The Teddy Bear has not been relegated entirely to the rear by Billy Possum or the polar bear that was let loose in toyland when Peary and Cook began their scurrying. The up-to-date Teddy Bear of the French make winds up and is calculated to indulge in a number of ludicrous somersaults. Another member of the bear family evolved by the French inventors is of large stature, and when wound stalks majestically about the room, moving one leg at a time in true quadruped fashion, with his red tongue lolling out over a brass muzzle. This toy is made to sell at \$4. The pink pig is another mechanical toy, cost \$2, which will sell well. It squeaks, rolls up its pink eyes and runs around in circles.

North Pole games will be legion, although most of them are based on old ideas. For instance, a board is marked with the route of the various explorers, and the game is to determine which, by a series of movements, can reach the pole and return first in safety. By means of another board, the question of which reached the pole first, Cook or Peary, can easily be settled. A globe is half circled by two sets of figures running from 1 to 6. Peary and Cook, the

players, get six markers each, and these take turns in covering the figured disks. If Peary leads off by putting a marker on 6, and Cook follows him with one on 3, he announces a total of nine, and the game is continued until won, the victor being the man who can first reach 31 with his marker. There are many variations of the old ideas all applied to the new game, the goal always being the pole. Eskimo dolls, Peary and Cook manikins, rubber balls made in the shape of the globe, with all its familiar outlines of continents and oceans, with the north pole standing out prominently, are common today.

The presence of Roosevelt in Africa has also given the toymakers ideas, and reproductions of bull lipopotami, elephants, lions and the like are many. One of the oddities is the "three toy," named after the battle, one of the queer birds of the battle. The comic supplement humors are also drawn upon for new ideas for plaster and rubber figures.

Fulton Memorial

It is expected that preliminary sets of drawings will be submitted by the architects next week for the \$3,000,000 memorial to Robert Fulton to be erected on Riverside Drive, between One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Sixteenth streets. Within the mausoleum, which is to form the centre piece of the proposed monument, will be re-interred the bones of Fulton, there to rest forever.

In the solid rock of the hillside will be built this magnificent tribute to the inventor of the steamboat. Viewed from the Hudson, the monument is expected to be without a peer in the world for natural and architectural beauty.

The background of this marble structure will contain world-famous buildings. Grant's Tomb, Columbia University's library, dome, Barnard College, the Cathedral of St. John, the Divine, and other superb edifices are included in the rich setting. Across the river tower the historic Palisades, famed for their grandeur.
